Happy Holidays,

I hope this Command Status Report finds you well and safe.

We continue the progress moving forward to strengthen STARFLEET into the future is going strong with new Committees and new processes. We are working hard going forward for the benefit of SFI with a focus on "new blood." Here is an update on where we are:

As of today, The Administration has these new, completed or is still progressing on:

- I am pleased to announce the appointment of Matthew Ingles as our new Chief of Membership Services.
- I am pleased to announce the appointment of Bran Stimpson as our new Chief of Information Services.
- Currently we still have no viable (cost effective) bids for IC2025. Keep an eye out for announcements on IC 26 as we will have information very soon on both. If no bids that meet the frugal attributes of our membership the ECAB meeting will be held via Zoom or Google meet some in August or September of 2025.
- We are in the active process of updating the Style Guide/ Intellectual Property Usage and the Member handbook SFDPP is currently in testing mode. It will be open to the EC and AB members on December 15th and the rest of the membership on January 1, 2025. All CO's, XO's, BOIC's, OIC's, DOIC's as well as everyone with enhanced access will be required to complete the new SFDPP with a passing grade of 80% by January 31st or your access will be revoked, and chapters put on standby.

More Work Ongoing:

- The Chief Cadet Office is in the planning stages of the new program and we anticipate a January launch.
- The Clean-up of the dataset continues in collaboration with the Admiralty Board as a reminder those that do not conform to the updated information regulations may get left behind until they update. It is better to do it now where it will take minutes vs waiting until the transition then it may take days to get you up to par.
- Directorships: Outstanding department is: the Master Chief Petty Officer (MCPO). This post is on the VR site and we are compiling the information. We are looking at the current applicants and will have this position filled soon.
- Further updates and clarifications within the Membership Handbook to enhance the experience and protect our membership. The MHB is in revision and will be presented to the AB for approval by the November meeting.
- We are still progressing looking at the Intellectual Property of the Organization ensuring no infringement on to the Franchise owners. We have been looking first at the STARFLEET and REGIONAL heraldry. I want to thank all the chapters and regions that have worked hard with David Yee to improve our heraldry production.

If you have an event that you wish me to come to your area do let me know and I will work it into my schedule. I'm in preparation to head back to Hawaii in the coming week and will be back planning my 2025 travels once I get resettled there. I am looking into R11 for sure. As we find ourselves in the heart of the holiday season and prepare to bid farewell to another incredible year, here is an update on some of the ongoing projects within the Office of the VCS.

Updating the Membership Handbook The Membership Handbook (MHB) is one of the most important resources for STARFLEET members and keeping it up to date is an absolute priority. Over the past year, the Admiralty Board (AB) has passed a number of resolutions that have introduced new rules, policies, and even added a few new auxiliaries. My office is currently working to integrate all of these changes into the next iteration of the MHB to ensure it remains an accurate, user-friendly guide for our members without devastating the work of the SFDPP team in January 2025. You should see the new MHB shortly after the SFDPP is closed out for the year.

Advancing the Organization's Style Guide

We're making significant updates to the STARFLEET Organizational Style Guide as we move to version 2.0. This revision incorporates directives from the Commander, STARFLEET (CS), and the Heraldry Office to better align STARFLEET's visual and textual identity along with following rules and guidelines given to us by Paramount.

Streamlining Committee Work

One of the key areas of focus has been collaborating with the AB to streamline committee work, one committee particularly being the IC Guide Committee. This group has experienced significant turnover, which has sometimes delayed progress. I am working to reduce the impact of such challenges by introducing new processes to make transitions smoother and workloads more manageable. These efforts are aimed at shortening committee timelines and ensuring productive outcomes moving forward.

Creating the 2024 AB Resolution Document

To improve transparency and accessibility, my office is working with the Archivist to compile a single, comprehensive document that catalogs all of the AB resolutions passed in 2024. This document will provide a centralized resource for members to reference and will serve as an essential tool for organizational continuity and will be able to be found in the Members' Hub early in 2025.

Looking Ahead

As we celebrate the holiday season and prepare to enter the new year, I want to express my gratitude to each of you for your dedication and service to STARFLEET. 2025 will mark the final year of this administration, and I am excited to see what fresh ideas and new perspectives the upcoming election will bring to our organization. Change is a hallmark of growth, and I look forward to seeing how STARFLEET evolves in the years ahead.

This is the busiest time of year for all of us with holiday preparations, holiday gatherings, and of course getting the CQ ready for publication on January 1st! I trust this finds you all tired but happy following all of the holiday excitement, and happily anticipating what the New Year promises!

The biggest project the last 2 months has been the two surveys utilizing the newly purchased Survey Monkey application. We received just a few negative comments, but overall the surveys were developed, delivered, and completed with few hiccups. The first survey to go out via Mailchimp was the Membership Census, and the second was the Diversity Survey developed by the Director of Diversity. The surveys reinforced what we already suspected - STARFLEET is indeed a very diverse group of individuals in many regards. The thing that draws us together is the appreciation for all things Star Trek.

November was a relatively quiet month for the CQ staff since it was between publications. The CQ staff was working on articles and features for the issue coming out January 1, 2025. STARFLEET'S Tales of Cosmic Imagination did not receive enough submissions for a full publication in January. The future of that publication is under review. We have decided though that one poem submitted will be included in this CQ since it is related to a regular feature in this publication. The new effort to include auxiliaries in the photo contests is going well and we'll have several photos from the Medical Auxiliary featured this time.

Charles Carden resigned mid-month as Public Relations Director due to the demands of his new job. I immediately got the position sent to Volunteer Resources for advertisement. I appreciate the work Charlie did getting SFI promoted in several con publications. Clive Burrell as Assistant PR Director has continued working on contacting cons in the UK, Ireland, and Europe. He wrote several press releases on behalf of a UK chapter that will be involved in OmnusCon. He has also opened discussions with the company behind Destination Trek.

Because it has not been utilized in several years, as well as continued issues with the platform and a lack of personnel to manage, it was decided to finally delete the SFI account on X (formerly Twitter). This was a practical decision, and had nothing to do with politics. Starting in the new year, STARFLEET will begin utilizing the newer platform BlueSky. Announcements will be made when content is ready for posting, but you can go ahead and sign up to follow STARFLEET to be ready in advance. The address is @sfi-inc.bsky.social.

Elsewhere in the Social Media Services area, the team has had a busy month on Facebook with lots of members posting daily. We do ask that you limit yourselves when reposting material from other sources to just once a day. That will help everyone by prioritizing material that is relevant to the organization itself. Declining potential members to the Members Only and Business Only groups continues daily, with the primary reason being that the required questions are not all answered. Please do not "Invite" other members to join (they need to do it for themselves) because the required questions do not get answered and the request has to be denied. If you haven't reviewed the Rules lately, please do so before sending something that may be in violation. Potential posts that violate any of the Rules will be denied. That doesn't happen a lot, but enough that we felt the need to remind you. SMS Director Ben Thomas and his team spend a lot of time daily monitoring the FB sites and we greatly appreciate their dedication. We also appreciate Assistant SMS Director Andrew Reist for doing the YouTube posting of the Sol Series programs from the Science Auxiliary. They are excellent programs with interviews/presentations by space science professionals, and we encourage you to check them out.

Pinterest continues to be a valuable resource for pictures, articles, and member postings. The top Boards the last month have been "News from around the Planet," "We Live for this Stuff," "Memes by Region," and "Science Related Events by Region." The monthly audience was 2.55k, with the age groups of 18-24 and 25-34 viewing the site most often.



CREATIVITY AND DEEP SPACE Marie Smith and Clive Burrell

From the edge of the Final Frontier to becoming a Wellbeing coach, Melanie Smith has certainly taken full advantage of life and all the possibilities it has provided.

Appearing in, unbelievably, just four episodes of Deep Space Nine, Smith's Torah Ziyal would provide key character motivations that would echo all the way to the series finale. A role that had already been played by Cyia Batten for "Indiscretion" and "Return to Grace" and Tracy Middendorf in "For the Cause", Melanie could still bring her own nuances to the part. Indeed, the six -part arc would offer extensive opportunities to develop the character.

"It was all my nuances. There were so many things scripted but we're always nuanced with how we live our experiences out in the world. When I got the structure on Torah Ziyal, I figured out what had happened to her and perhaps interpreted differently to even how the writers saw her. I think that's the job of an actor. You get the things on the page, and you bring life to it."

Arriving on the station in the sixth season opener, "A Time to Stand", Ziyal appears to have been brought to DS9 for her own safety but her father, Gul Dukat, may have other uses for her presence.

"My agent called me, and I believe I'd just finished *Seinfeld*, and they were looking for this character and I got the script, and I had my own take on the role. I had this very specific read on who this Torah Ziyal was. I went in to meet with producers and there were a ton of other actresses there whose work I knew. They were dressed so differently and had such a different take on the character."

Thinking that she had blown the opportunity by turning up in a summer dress and not what appeared to be the combat boot and fatigue combo Melanie was surprised to receive a call pretty much straight after the read.

"I'd stuck with my vision of the character, and I think that I did that read with Marc (Alaimo). At the end I grabbed my things and left but then I got the call from my agent saying that they weren't sure what I'd done but I got the role."

Seeing the audition as a chance to do what she loved and to enjoy her craft, Melanie went into the audition with the opinion that there were no consequences of exploring her concept of the character and that may well have been a good part of the reason she was given the role.

At the time, the actress only knew that the role would be recurring; "I'm not sure how long she would have run had I not wanted to leave the show. I didn't leave because I didn't love the show, but I was getting bad headaches and allergic reactions to the makeup and prosthetics. When they did the 50th anniversary in Las Vegas all the other characters they were considering killing off for that episode (*Sacrifice of Angels*) came up and thanked me!"



Melanie had a handful of regular roles on TV before taking up the part in DS9 but had found that after several years of doing the same part it felt more like a job than something she truly loved. This led to her becoming recognized as being someone who preferred recurring roles which included *Melrose Place* and *Murder, She Wrote*.

"My agent had been in negotiation to do another series of recurring

appearances... I don't know what the next (DS9) contract was that was in negotiation, but I basically said I can't do it anymore. I loved the role and it's one of my favorites that I ever played."

Easily picked as her favorite moment was Ziyal's death scene; "For an actor there are very few death scenes out there so it's cool to have done it and I was so excited for it. There was also a beautiful scene between myself. Nana and Marc where I'm trying to get them together and talk about my art and having a dream. When I read about Torah Ziyal the breakdown was very much about her as survivor of a PoW camp, father as head of the Dominion and it all sounded very aggressive but there was part of me that recognized her as the ambassador of peace. The last archetypal structure of this universe that is of the innocent and so at the core of me playing Torah Ziyal I felt that she was childlike. When she sat with Marc and Nana and that whole scene about wanting her art to bring people together—who in our lives and in our world wants unity and union more than someone who's never had it. Her dream was to be a part of something filled with love because she knew nothing other than harshness in her life... that scene was the core of what the character was based in."

In terms of the relationship with Garak though it turns out that Melanie was surprised to learn that the Cardassian tailor was not envisioned by actor Andrew Robinson as being heterosexual but more ambiguous in nature; "He's a terrific actor, a real Thespian," noted Melanie who had previously worked with Robinson on Trancers. "For a lot of my career I was pigeonholed into playing these strong sexy women. What I loved about Ziyal and that show was that we weren't human and weren't pigeonholed into human identities and you could make inner choices that allowed you to be a creature. There are so many animals that are pansexual and could give us so many different pronouns, but I never knew that about him (Garak)!

"I was a big *Star Trek* kid, and that show was light years ahead at the time. It was so creative. I loved that and *Twilight Zone*.

The talents of the designers (on DS9) was fantastic—the sets, the makeup, the costumes. It took four hours to get the makeup on and two hours to get it

off. Then you're in neoprene (effectively the same as a surfer bodysuit) and what I loved about the cast was the understanding that it all wore us, and everyone was very compassionate if you missed a line or lost focus. I had about 100 bobby pins in my hair as well under a 10lb wig. It was then glued on so if one pin got loose you can't unglue it so you're having to bear it if it digs in. There were some of us that had some very intense makeup."

While Melanie clearly remembers her time on the show with great fondness, expressing that she doesn't have a bad word to say about all those involved, it was the prosthetics that did cause some issues; "I struggled with the physical aspect of it. I was having allergic reactions to it and my skin would burn. That was it. My co-actors were fabulous and really talented."

So how did Torah Ziyal, daughter of Dukat get from the depths of deep space to where Melanie Smith is now?

After the birth of her son, life's priorities changed; "I was doing a series on Lifetime and I hated the fact that I would look at the script and the call sheet and say 'Mommy's going to be home for tea tonight' and then I wasn't. We would be in the middle of the scenes so I couldn't even get to the phone to say I would be late. I started realizing that I couldn't live in that space where I wasn't the best mother, and I wasn't the best actress anymore."

When at work Melanie was thinking about needing to be at home and when at home, she was conscious of the work pressures; so, a decision had to be made, and it came down to ensuring that her son's growth and development were the absolute priority. Melanie moved out of Los Angeles and another creative inspiration hit leading to her opening a wellness center.

"At my core I'm a creator and an artist," explained Melanie, "And people think of artists in the wrong way—if you don't sing, paint or act you're not an artist but artistry is the need to constantly create beauty in the world. Whatever is borne from us at that time is our art. At a very young age I was involved with lots of things. I was a dancer, creative writer, a painter for a period of time, I sang, I acted but I was also a spiritual journeyman. I always felt a spiritual connection to something greater than myself."

Melanie is always looking out for ways in which she can use her skills to create something beautiful that will change others' perspectives. That comes from not just an exploration of skills but also from her own personal life experiences.

"As a child I was very sick, and I experienced a lot of grief episodes; my mom died when I was young and then my sister was killed. You can easily victimize yourself instead of saying you need me to know something about this so I can help them. There is a reason for everything, and things unite from all over. When something happens to me it's also happening to someone else, and I want to transmute that into something else so I can help them. That's part of my artistry. Even through my music (Melanie has released a jazz album The Broken and the Breaker which you can find on Spotify) that's all about the journey; being broken but also about breaking things."

"When I spoke at the 50th anniversary at Las Vegas and before I talked about the show or my thoughts on the show, I said that I want to talk about you (the fans). If the world cared that much about something, if everyone in the world cared that much about something that unified us and elevated curiosity and created a sense of unity, community and intimacy we would be a healthy world. It would be so much happier, and I thanked them for letting me see a glimpse of that."

Melanie has also released a book entitled *Unfinished Business*. "I've been working with grief, heartbreak and trauma for over 20 years now... so I really worked deeply in myself to heal and live a life of joy. You hear a lot of people say you learn to live with it, and you'll get over it, but I never believed that. I have always believed that we can go to the depths of ourselves to heal any breaks ourselves and as I developed this process, I started to see people's lives really changed."

Clients were asking about how they could relate the information being given to them through Melanie's wellness center and even to write a book on the topics they were talking to

her about.

"Finally, Covid hit, and I was one of the early people in New York who had it. No-one knew I'd got it, and I was so out of it. I had a high temperature for about 14 days. I couldn't breathe."

Getting up one day, unable to go anywhere or do anything, Melanie sat down and started to write. Structuring it, visualizing the title and putting it all together, a friend insisted she send it to publishers when the original thought had been just to provide it for clients.

"I had a meeting with about 12 publishers and decided on one. It's incredible when you get emails saying that you've helped save the life of someone's child or that *Unfinished Business* stopped a person from attempting suicide."

"What means something to me (through the book) is that you've found your part, or that you're in love again or that you are closer to your child. That's what matters."

And one final thought—what could Melanie recommend to help the R20 community enhance their own wellness in the future?

"If we got up every day and we believed in something, we were inspired by something and it had a metaphysical aspect to it, as all Star Trek's do, you have the answers to wellness. Love each other, believe in similar things, find bonding and intimate relationships, laugh, elevate, be curious and find what's new today. Try to enhance the world and if you could write down the 15 points that unify all Trekkies you would have your answers to wellness."

Region 13:



From the Desk of the STARFLEET Fandom Academy Commandant:

Time for our (almost) end of the year report! From January 1st through November 30th, SFA saw 24,462 courses taken, and we served 1,099 individual students. I am confident that before the end of the year, this number will reach 25.000 courses and over 1,110 students. November actually had the lowest numbers of the year, with just over 1,200 courses taken by only 123 students. January was of course our best month because of SFDPP. If you eliminate that, then the top month was July, with almost 2,800 courses taken by almost 200 students.

Our big project right now is of course SFDPP recertification. Doing things a little differently this year, STARFLEET HQ staff members (EC, AB, etc.) will be taking the course at the end of December, and the remaining members will start taking it in January. Please remember that it should be taken before Feb. 1st. All members who are required to take the exam must recertify during this time, regardless of when you originally took 101 and 102. If you have any questions, please contact me at sfa-academy@sfi.org and I will be happy to help.

We do have one important logistical announcement. When a member applies for a Moodle account, you MUST use the name that you have in the database. This helps avoid confusion, and helps staff members ensure that we are crediting the correct members when you take exams. If you apply and the name does not match, you will not be allowed to have a Moodle account. At some point, we will be auditing all existing accounts and requesting that any members with different names in Moodle and in the database change one or the other so that they match. (Please note: names like Mike/ Michael, Bill/William, Chris/ Christopher, etc. are not a problem, as long as we can tell that it is the same person.)

If you are interested in joining SFA staff, please check the <u>Volunteer</u> <u>Resources</u> page to see what openings we have. There is always a listing for Assistant Directors, but we sometimes have other openings as well. If you prefer to stay in the background but contribute to SFA, we do often use ghost writers to help us create exams and manuals, and those persons are not technically part of our staff. Lastly, if you have an idea for a new course or college, we would be happy for you to submit a proposal. For any of these things, you can contact me at <u>sfa-academy@sfi.org</u> and I will be happy to discuss your options with you.

The STARFLEET Marine Training Centre currently comprises 3 Institutes containing 14 colleges with over 160 available courses.

Infantry was the most popular course at 23 completed, most likely due to the current 12BDE Marine Challenge. Armor came in second with 10 courses, while Leadership and SpecOps each had 6 apiece. Only 7 Branches had students, and the most common score was in the Honors range (45%), then Pass (34%), with 21% of the students acing the exams. We welcomed 1 new Marine into the fold.

Currently all Colleges have a Director.

We are still looking for three Deans to oversee the Institutes. If you are interested, the application can be found on the SFI website at Volunteer Resources - STARFLEET (<u>sfi.org</u>)

Please remember that all students must use the same name in Moodle that they use in the STARFLEET database. Per CES HQ, Moodle applications will be refused if they don't match what's in the database. Simple first name differences are acceptable as long as it is a recognizable variation, like Mike/ Michael or Rob/Robert, but the last name must match what's in the database.

We now have our own licenses instead of 'borrowing' licenses from others on our team.



KELVIN KORNER: "THE UNSETTLING STARS" ENS Vince Ceraso, SCC 86287



Formally known as *Star Trek Refugees,*

Star Trek: The Unsettling Stars (ST:TUS) is a 2020 novel and the first of two full-length novels to be written in the alternate Kelvin timeline.



I will be tackling Kelvinverse media in my new CQ column, "Kelvin Korner", beginning with this book review. These won't be entirely spoiler-free reviews, but the endings are safe with me.

Taking place shortly after the catastrophic events of the 2009 film, we find the newly appointed crew of the USS *Enterprise* on a routine shakedown cruise in a lonely corner of Federation space. After coming across a helpless colony ship under enemy fire, the Starfleet explorers offer the survivors refuge on the flagship. The survivors, called Perenorians, are described as small and furry with freakishly big eyes and ears...and seven fingers. To everyone's surprise, the Perenorians turn out to be fast learners about their surroundings. *Too fast.* So much so that, for instance, they learn the language of the Starfleet crew—predominately English—in mere minutes.

In addition, Perenorians are master engineers, building ships and even weapons entirely by hand and in almost no time at all. 1,000 Geordi La Forges with the latest Starfleet gadgets couldn't compete with 25 Perenorians and their bare, sevenfingered hands.

The *Enterprise* offers to take the Perenorians to an uninhabited moon to put their remarkable engineering skills to use and build a new colony for the survivors. *What could possibly go wrong?*

No one wants to help the Perenorians more than Commander Spock. With the destruction of Vulcan fresh in his mind, he'd never forgive himself if he turned away fellow refugees. Even if it means disregarding logic and letting his guard down. All the while trying to keep his relationship with Lt. Nyota Uhura intact.

James T. Kirk is still getting used to being in the captain's chair. The pressure is mounting and all eyes in the quadrant are on the fastest-tracked captain in (alternate) Starfleet history. He knows he has but one shot to prove he's earned his place in the chair. Unfortunately, his new guests might pose a few issues.

Alan Dean Foster did an outstanding job capturing the vibe of the Kelvin timeline. There's a subtle sense of growing anxiety throughout the young *Enterprise* senior staff, having recently saved the entire Federation from genocidal Romulans.

Whether it's TOS or the reboot movies, some of my favorite moments in *Star Trek* are the interactions between the rough-edged Dr. Leonard "Bones" McCoy and witty first officer Spock. Foster, a longtime fan of the franchise, did well not to forget their comical bickering.

Just as importantly, Foster focuses in on other senior officers and their day-to-day activities, such as Hikaru Sulu's fencing training and baby-faced Pavel Chekov's prodigal chess skills. There's also a focus on the many background officers and their capabilities, such as members of Scotty's engineering team.

Foster (as well as other *Star Trek* authors) shining a spotlight on lesser -known officers, serves to further immerse the readers into the massive universe Gene Roddenberry penned in the 1960s. Every Starfleet officer has something to offer!

ST:TUS is a stellar entry in expanding the Kelvinverse, which, in true *Star Trek* fashion, remains largely uncharted with its limited media. But that only means there's a whole new universe of possibilities for storytelling, and plenty to talk about in future *CQ* columns.

I give the thrilling *Star Trek: The Unsettling Stars* an 8/10–or perhaps 6 Perenorian fingers out of 7. If you're a Starfleet Marine Corps member looking to continue your commandant book challenge, add this entry to your list!



GOING ROGUE WITH LENORE ZANN RADM Dean Rogers, SCC 47082

On this latest edition of CQ Snapshots, imagine if you will, you're at home in 1992 watching your favorite Saturday morning cartoons, and you happen to tune into Fox Kids, and you're seeing X-Men: The Animated Series in all their animated glory. Our guest is part of that phenomenon. In her memoir, A Rogue's Tale: A Memoir, she takes readers on a rare behind the scenes look at her experiences voicing one of the most iconic characters of the 1990s and she has some encounters with some Hollywood legends, like Spielberg and Keanu Reeves. Her latest project, X-Men '97 which airs on Disney+, has gone on to earn many accolades.



My friends of the Fleet, I have the honor of talking to the one and only, Rogue aka Lenore Zann!

Lenore, welcome to CQ Snapshots! Well, hey there, Suga. It's a pleasure to be here

To hear that "Suga" just brings back a lot of childhood memories. First off, I cannot believe we missed each other at a convention down here in my area, Fairfax Comic Con. But I'm talking to you, that's the most important thing.

It's great to be here, and it was great to get to Fairfax as well. It's been nice to get all around the United States and meet fans from right from one coast to the other. It's been an amazing journey.

Was this your first time in the DC metropolitan area by any chance? You know, it actually was. I'd love to come back and do some like historic touring, so that I can go to some of the iconic places, even like to the White House and stuff like that. Love to see where George Washington lived and learn more about the early days. I'm really fascinated with American history. My mom taught history, and so I've always been a history buff, but I'd love to get down there, especially in the spring, when all the cherry blossoms are out. I'd love to come then

As a lifelong Washington I can tell you, you have to come down for the cherry blossoms. The Cherry Blossom Festival is an amazing experience. I just did my very first visit to the White House a week ago. Oh, really, wow. And I can you go inside and everything? Are there tours?

Yes, you can go outside and visit see some of the different rooms in the White House, especially the room that really fascinated me was the room where, not only that President Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1964 but Lin-Manuel Miranda performed Hamilton. I wish I could have seen that.

I would be remiss by not saying congratulations to X-Men '97 for being awarded Best Animated series or TV movie at the most recent Astra TV awards. You were nominated for Best Voice Over performance, but you were the one that got to accept the award on behalf of your crew. How did it feel to get that accolade recently? Well, it was pretty exciting for all of us. You know, those of us who are in the original show, the OG cast, who started doing this 30 years ago and believed in the show then and then went away and had lives in between then and now in the acting profession, and I also went into politics, to come back from all of that and then be winning all these awards for our new work as X-Men' 97 cast members. It's like a dream come true. We're all very excited, and we're all very, very grateful. We're grateful that Marvel and Disney thought to bring us back, and that the fans have been so loval to us and to the show over the years, which is why the show is back in the first place.

Yes, and the hits keep on coming.

While I have you here, I will grab the award and show it to you. I have it with me here in Toronto, because I brought it with me to show on one of the interviews that I've done this week for my book, but it's a beautiful award. They're called the Astras, and it's the Hollywood Creative Alliance who gives these awards out. It was one of the most beautiful award ceremonies I've ever attended, and they even had puppies on the red carpet for adoption. And I believe I'm going to be adopting a little puppy.

Now do you have a name for the puppy yet?

Of course, I do, and he's a little boy. So, I'm gonna call him Remy Labeau, my little Remy. I'll have to show him from time to time when I come on interviews from now on. He's very cute.

The hits just keep on coming for the show. The Critic's Choice Awards just nominated the show for Best Animated Series. Entertainment Weekly had named one of the episodes one of the 20 best episodes of 2024 and it's one of my favorite episodes of the entire season, Remember It.

I read in your Instagram that you were "given a script that enabled you to express your depth of emotions as an actor and as a human being in this world full of sorrow, heartache, loss and pain." Now for those who have not seen this masterpiece, tell us about this particular episode that has made the top of the accolades for 2024. Well, thank you for that. And yes, that was part of the speech that I wrote. I was given about 10 minutes before I knew that we were going to be getting up on stage and winning that award. So, I scribbled this speech on my on my little phone with my thumb. But I felt like I needed to address the fact that there has been so much suffering and sadness and grief out there in the world, because so many people are losing people that they love throughout the pandemic. For instance, now in wars, in terrible mass shootings, things like this.

When I got a script, the script for "Remember It", which is about the loss of two loved ones of Rogue, my character, it's overpowering and the grief of being in a war zone and in a place where she witnesses everybody get wiped out, including her loved ones. It's overwhelming, and I had just lost my own sweet, dear little niece, Maya, who was 17, and she battled cancer for a few years. And she battled it valiantly, and in the end, it took her young life, and it was





devastating for myself, my sister, of course, her mom, our parents, her brothers and her husband, and we just-- we were in such deep grief.

And when I got the script to "Remember It" and I read it, I thought, here's a place to place my grief. I can use the grief that I'm feeling, my authentic grief and pour it into my work, into my performance as an actor, so that other people can feel it. They can hear it in my voice, and it will hopefully reverberate within them, so that if they've lost anyone, and they know maybe they're deeply grieving and they're not even aware of it, that it might loosen that up and make them feel their feelings, and have them released in like a cathartic way, and then hopefully get some healing.


And I was really pleased to see that the reaction to that episode was exactly that. I mean, it broke the internet, people were saying, you broke me. You know your last words, "Suga, I can't feel you" broke me. And I say, Well, that's good. It's good to feel your feelings. And that was the episode we also got nominated for an Emmy Award, but we didn't win, unfortunately. I feel really grateful and blessed that I was given that opportunity and hopefully made other people feel their own feelings and maybe get some healing as well.

Well, I can tell you, from personal experience, it touched me, even after losing both my parents for over 30 years now, and that episode gave some comfort to me personally. So, thank you to the writers, to the acting talents of you and the cast, and I'm so glad that Entertainment Weekly among the Emmys recognize this pure, brilliant masterpiece.

We appreciate it very much, thank you.

I read your memoir maybe two times so far. Wow. And I love the adventures. I love the chapters about acting. One of the captions that I remember from the book is you mentioned that "Rogue is a hero with an Achilles' heel, a unique one that could prove deadly. However, in her case, her greatest strength is also her Achilles' heel". Tell us what you mean about that quote.

Well, thank you for that great question. I often liken the X-Men and these superhero characters to our modern -day, mythological heroes. So, as a child, I was fascinated with Greek mythology, with Roman mythology. As it turned out, from all around the world, many of the world's cultures have similar stories, but just with different names of the heroes and the different mythological heroes, have different strengths and properties, like our superheroes of today.



Also, in Greek tragedy, they talk about these tragic heroes having a fatal flaw, which they call their Achilles' heel. And they call that because Achilles, although he was super strong and everything and great in battle, got shot by an arrow in his Achilles, what we would now call the Achilles' heel, and it killed him. And so that's why, to this day it's called the Achilles' heel, that is somebody's fatal flaw, their weakness, their vulnerability.

So, Rogue, I say her greatest strength is also her Achilles' heel because her greatest strength is that, obviously, she can fly. That's fine. She's got super strength. She can pick up buildings and throw them. Okay, but she can touch somebody skin to skin, drain them of all their life force, and take it upon herself and get stronger and take upon her all their superpowers and properties. But that makes her stronger, but it's also her greatest weakness and vulnerability because it means she can never be in love. She can never be intimate with somebody. She can never let her guard down, because she's afraid that if she does-- if she falls for it-- if she lets Remy kiss her too long, if she does that, she will kill the person or people that she loves. So, she always has to have this armor up where she stays strong and kind of silent on her own; like, don't touch me, right. As opposed to getting out there and being able to just live her life like everybody else. And that's why I call it her greatest strength and her Achilles' heel.

You're absolutely right now that you put in that perspective. I kept reading and found that your starting point in your career was playing an iconic actress, Marilyn Monroe, and now you played her three times. In fact, in the early part of this century, you developed a play called The Marilyn Tapes. How did your experience portraying Marilyn Monroe help you connect with fans and characters on a deeper level? Thank you. Well, you know, when I first played Marilyn, I was discovered by the composer, writer of the show called Hey, Marilyn. He had just completed writing a rock opera on the life of Marilyn Monroe, and they'd been searching for about a year for the right actress to play the role. They'd searched in Hollywood and New York. They searched from one end of North America to the other. And then he came to see a concert in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, which is where Anne of Green Gables is from. And that summer, I had been hired as a young 20-year-old to understudy Anne in Anne of Green Gables the Musical.

And I had never gotten to go on to play Anne that summer, but at the end of the summer, they had a big concert, and they said, "you're allowed to perform something that will show what you can really do." I did a Barbra Streisand song from the musical Funny Girl, and I did it as a Marlena Dietrich impersonation. This author happened to be in the audience that night, and he turned to his wife at the end of my performances, and they both said to each other. "That's Marilyn." And that was how I was cast. At 20, I delved into the life of Marilyn Monroe. I read every book I could find on her. I quickly sussed out that she seemed to be two people. She was the Norma Jean Baker, the shy girl who really wanted love, who didn't feel



like she was really worthy of love, who was trying desperately to be liked and loved by people. And then the showgirl, Marilyn, which was the facade that she put on for the camera-- when she was trying to impress men. And my performance became that dichotomy, which is what made people really love the performance so much.

And like the critics all said, "A star is born" the day after the show opened. So that was the beginning of my love affair with Marilyn, and when I was in my later on, in my 20s, I was asked to play her again in another musical. And then at the end of my years of acting on the stage, at that time, in my 40s, I decided to write a play about her called The Marilyn Tapes. And I did it again with music, I sing as well. I did it at the Neptune Theater in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and then I took it to New York, and I did it for a year there.

And interestingly, there's a lot about Marilyn that I can relate to. I was playing sex kitten roles. I was playing Marilyn Monroe at an early age and then kept getting passed in these kinds of femme fatale roles. But I was more than that, and I just didn't seem to be able to break out of that stereotype, just like Marilyn, and that's what my play was about. It was about being a female in the 1950s trying to break out of the stereotypes that society has for you and also the stereotype that we have to look a certain way because so many women have body dysmorphia, and men too these days, where they have to feel that they have to be as skinny as a toothpick, but with have big breasts and, you know, big calf muscles.

You know, it's sad that so many young people are resorting to getting surgery to try and look like something like they think they will be loved and accepted for, which is not going to last. It was great for me to be able to write about all this stuff and then perform it. And very healing as well. And then doing that show in New York showed me that I loved doing my own work and getting my own political and socio-economic messages.

Then that led to me being asked to run for politics back in my home province of Nova Scotia. I suddenly realized, "oh, I can take the mask of a character off, and I can just be myself. I can speak as myself and get these messages about all the environment, diversity, inclusion and equality. I can do that as myself, not just as a character. I was an elected politician for 12 years in Nova Scotia and Canada as a member of parliament and member of the Legislative Assembly. So, who would think that Marilyn Monroe would lead to that?

That's a great transition to my next question because many people don't know that you served as a member of parliament and a bill that you crafted, Bill C-226 had just finally passed in the Senate. Now for those who have not heard about this bill, tell us what it's all about and your feelings that it has finally something you helped to create pass in the Senate?

Well, I became a member of the Legislative Assembly, which is basically the equivalent of a state Congresswoman, I was elected three times in a row. I was there for 10 years in the legislature in Halifax, Nova Scotia. And I introduced a private members' bill called An Act to Address Environmental Racism. Environmental racism is the disproportionate number of toxic dumps, waste sites, landfills and corporate polluters that are placed on or beside racialized communities, and that would normally be black communities and indigenous communities. That means that the people in those communities have worse health outcomes, because they're dealing with like mercury in the water or whatever, whatever the toxicity is. I felt that it was really important to get this bill introduced and debated in Nova Scotia. It did not pass.

But then, after 10 years of being in provincial government. I ran federally for Prime Minister Trudeau, and won and became a member of parliament. And my very first day on Parliament Hill, I went to the parliamentary lawyers, and I said, "Please, here's my bill that I introduced in Nova Scotia. Can you help me turn it into a strategy for the entire country of Canada, a national strategy on addressing environmental racism and environmental justice"? And we did, and I introduced it, and it just passed this past summer. It became law. We got royal assent. It's now the law of the land. It took me 10 years to get from beginning to end, and now it's law in Canada.

That is sensational. I'm so glad to hear that you've done great work for not only the community, but for Canada.

Appreciate that very much!

Now I want to go back to X-Men for a little bit. Growing up watching X-Men was really touching for me because of all the subjects it, for a cartoon series, was able to talk about back then. It touched on diversity & acceptance. How do you think some of these themes still remain relevant 30-plus years later? First of all, I gotta say, my heart goes out to anybody who has experienced bigotry, racism, discrimination. I'm really sorry for any of the hurt, that you ever experienced as a young person growing up or even now. It's not easy, and sadly, hatred is an age-old human thing, and it keeps being regurgitated and taught to new generations. Our show is the antithesis of that. We teach everybody that, "Hey, it's okay to be different, and isn't it beautiful?' and "Hey, let's all try to get along, and let's work together to make the world a better place." That's why I went into politics, and that's why Rogue fights for the underdog. She will fight. She will put her life on the line, not only for her friends but for those who cannot fight for themselves. She'll be there. She is their hero, and she will fight to the death.

I love that about her. I think that in this day and age that we're still dealing with the bigotry and racism that keeps raising its ugly head. Because the writers of the original show and the director, Larry Houston, who's an African American, wonderful artist and writer himself, we always thought that by this time, the world would be different. People would have learned the lessons that we were trying to teach. The people I meet at comic cons who were kids in the 90s loved our show. They exude all of that warmth, love, fellowship, understanding, tolerance and acceptance.

I think if only the world has more X-Men fans in it, we can change the world. We can make it a much better place. I think let's just keep doing the show. Let's keep getting more and more people to watch it. It's great to see parents turning their children onto it. Sometimes we have three generations of families coming up to us at comic cons who just love the

show from six years old on up. So again, I'm sad that it still has to be a thing. But while it's there, we are going to be there to try and teach people and educate people, and to also say to everyone feeling othered and feeling put down, "Hey, you know you're you are loved, you are appreciated. Be yourself, don't be ashamed."



Now let me take you back to that moment when you got the call to reprise Roque after 20-plus years. What was your first reaction that they're bringing back X-Men? It's funny. When I first I got an email first from a friend in the States, Mike Perez had put us together to do an X-Men reunion in Texas back in 2019. He said, "Hey, Lenore, you know, I know someone who knows someone in Disney is trying to find you. They want to talk to you about a new show or something." And I was like, "yeah, right, tell me another one." I mean, honestly, I thought it was a joke. I didn't really believe it.

I was in Nova Scotia. I just finished

my 12 years in government. And then I said, "Well?" He said, "No, no, I think it's serious." I said "Well, if it's serious, give them my phone number." And next thing I got a call from Meredith Lane, the casting director for Disney. And she was saying, "Hey, Lenore. Listen, the producers are about to do a new show, and they'd like you to audition for it. Would you mind if I send you a script? Would you put down some lines and send it back to us?" And that's how it started. When I got this the script and looked at the lines, I realized, "Oh, I know these lines. I've said these lines back 30 years ago." I just, I went, "Okay, I guess they're looking for Rogue." So, I just did Rogue. I'd send it back, but this time on a cell phone by mp3, which didn't exist. Well, Rogue has come into the 21st century.

Why does Rogue resonate with fans?

I think Rogue resonates for a number of different reasons. From what I'm told from fans, first of all, she is sexy. When I first auditioned for the role, my agent said, "Lenore, they're looking for a woman with a deep husky sexy voice, who can do a southern accent". And she said, "That's you, so get on there, right?" I believe that there's partly that, but also, she's selfdeprecating, she doesn't take fools lightly. She's a strong woman. She fights for the underdog. She's the kind of woman you would want in your camp if you were at school. If you were being bullied, you want Rogue in your corner, because she wouldn't take that. She would put them all in their place.

However, she also has this vulnerability, which is that she can never allow herself to be in love and to be intimate. And there's a longing, a loneliness, a sadness deep underneath everything else. I think that also people relate to that. A lot of people in the LGBTQ community have told me that they relate to that because they grew up at a time when they when they felt like they can't really express their feelings for another person, and they can't go around showing their feelings and clustering the whole AIDS epidemic. People were afraid to love one another in case they killed each other, similar stuff. I think she relates to many people for many different things, for many different reasons.

THE BUSINESS OF A BETTER YEAR CAPT Justin Hunt, SCC 82886

As we enter the new year,

many will be making resolutions; most of which will deal with personal growth and improvement. The level of optimism that begins each year is admirable, but it sadly drops off quickly. The grind of daily life combines with the little speedbumps along the way to eventually slow us down to a near halt. The more dedicated are able to keep moving forward, though their rate of progress is variable. The key to their forward progress is often their mindset.

We have all heard about the power of positive thinking. Many of us have heard about it to the point where we just roll our eyes and tone out the one talking about it. That's usually because the motivational speaker or author forgets to include practical application as part of the discussion. Though I'm loath to say it, this is one point in which the Ferengi have it right.

In the case of the Ferengi, their culture is centered on results. All the fine talk in the world means nothing unless it results in something tangible. As "hoomans", we know that the most meaningful acquisitions in life are the intangibles, but many of the same rules apply in our daily lives. One of these is a point brought up in, "The Storyteller" (DS9: S.1 Ep. 13). A young leader is so concerned with seeming strong that she is afraid to negotiate. Nog, being the young Ferengi that he is, teaches her the value of seeing a problem as an opportunity. This is a remarkably positive point in the culture that represents capitalism without compassion.

So many points in my personal life could have been improved had I been willing to concede one thing to gain another. While personal values shouldn't be compromised for profit (a very hooman thought, I know), the highest price I would have paid in most of these incidents was merely my pride. A foolish level of pride is frequently the stumbling block to the forward progress in our personal and professional lives. Many religions teach against this level of pride. It was so common a thing that there is a word specifically for it in the Anglo-Saxon language; "Ofermod." Variations of this term are still in use in many modern languages today. But when we can overcome this form of pride, we can see the benefits born of compromise and negotiation.

As the 77th Rule of Acquisition states, "It is better to swallow your pride than to lose your profit." Or as it is more simply put in the 225th Rule of Acquisition, "Pride comes before a loss." My pride has made me throw away opportunities that would have benefited myself and others. But, more often than not, it has made me refuse to let go of things that have held me back. Most of these things that I have refused to let go of seemed like small problems at first. However, after a while those small problems add up.

The 94th rule states, "Beware of small expenses: a small leak will kill a ship." We need to be aware of the things that are holding us back. Though hard, knowing when to lay something to rest or step back is a most beneficial (profitable) skill to have. Long term struggles will wear on us. A lot of people go into a new year claiming

If we want to not only start this new year as a new opportunity but end it in the black as well; we need to take stock. Once we have determined what is good and what is bad, then we can deal with it all accordingly. And deal with it we must. Remember that you are in charge of your life. We have to maintain a balance between our life and our obligations. While each of us have our own priorities, it is important that we occasionally make sure that they are still in what we perceive to be the right order and that we are observing them in practice.

The New Year is a perfect time to do just that. Because life, like a stream, has a way of just moving us along if we don't plant our feet to stand against the current. The 22nd rule of acquisition says, "A wise man can hear profit on the wind." And wisdom comes with experience. We have all had our share of ups and downs. Let us reflect on those and keep our ears open for better times. May this new year bring us profits untold, and remember the 183rd rule, "when life hands you ungaberries, make detergent."



I'm excited to share two excellent reports about conventions attended by our SFI family in 2024 - DragonCon in Atlanta, Georgia and brand new convention, SpaceCon, in San Antonio, Texas. Both conventions featured an impressive Trek guest line-up - what an absolute treat! My heartfelt thanks go to RADM Sandarg and ADM Franck for sharing these experiences with us.

DragonCon 2024

29 August to 2 September 2024 RADM Jana Sandarg, XO, USS Star League, Region 1

Four crew members of the USS *Star League* completed an away mission to DragonCon, in Atlanta, Georgia, a five-day event attended by over 72,000 people (which works out to about 6,000 cans of sardines, if you can imagine it).

LCDR Jamie Knowles and LCDR Aaron Knowles participated in Saturday's parade, and RADM Jana Sandarg and CMDR Robert Sandarg took part in the Star Trek Photo Shoot on the patio steps of the Hilton Hotel. Better said... four members of the USS *Star League* had the time of their lives at 2024 DragonCon, with *Star Trek* fore and aft, port and starboard, in present and future time currents.

Star Trekkers were seen at every turn of this downtown Atlanta con, in uniforms representing all of the Star Trek shows; even if you didn't recognize which show the uniforms were from, you knew they were Star Trek because of the similarity in style, color and insignia. So much disparity, yet so much similarity. And who wouldn't recognize the Borg?? The cosplay ingenuity was totally awe inspiring.

And the *Star Trek* panels were packed, truly, to the max.

The first panel we attended was with the inimitable Walter Koenig from The Original Series (TOS), renowned for playing Pavel Chekov. He burst onto stage with *Voyager's* Harry Kim, our own Garrett Wang. The two made a duelling dynamic of quips after jokes after tales after laughter. Garrett Wang is the consummate interviewer for Star Trek stars, not just because he is a famous actor in his own right, but because he knows the Star Trek universe so well and is a master at eliciting conversation with his guests. And, as Garrett noted, his last name, Wang, and Walter's surname, Koenig, both mean "King" ... and Kings, indeed, they are.

This interest was, in large part, because of the exceptional line up of 20 Star Trek guests, including the original Captain Kirk, William Shatner, plus Denise Crosby, John de Lancie, Gates McFadden, Robert Duncan McNeill, Robert Picardo, Brent Spiner, Garrett Wang, Matthew Wood, Jeri Ryan, LeVar Burton, Tim Russ, Kate Mulgrew, Robert Beltran, Anson Mount, Ethan Peck, Todd Stashwick, Michelle Hurd, Jess Bush, Melissa Navia, Terry Matalasa, from TNG, Voyager, ST Picard and Strange New Worlds. Add to this a truly massive list of actors from other science fiction and pop culture shows and movies. What an exceptional opportunity to "introduce" ourselves to these organisers and promote the benefits of our involvement to the con and con attendees.

Due to the tireless communications of *Zavala* member, LT Earl Simon, with the con management, we were over the moon to secure a 20 foot by 10 foot space, for free, for the booth, which was shared between the USS *Zavala*, USS *Battle Born*, USS *Tarvos*, and USS *Veritas*, a great example of chapters working together to promote STARFLEET and Region 3 Chapters.

The R3 booth was eye-catching, to say the least, dominated by the iconic TOS Captain's Chair, nav and helm console, Captain's conference room table and chairs, and a table full of recruitment materials, hand props, and charity fundraising items, all framed by three 10 x 8 foot backdrops, All of this was made possible by the 15 members of the USS *Zavala* making the 3-hour trek from Houston to San Antonio... with three trucks and one U-Haul trailer packed with the props and set pieces for the booth.

The Captain's Chair and other set pieces were hugely popular for photos and, at multiple times over the weekend, there were long queues at the booth. The chair's owner, Earl Simon, had brought several *TOS* uniform tops for attendees to slip on for their pictures, with Velcro sewn down the back to make them easy to put on quickly. This was another (optional) opportunity for visitors to donate to our charity fundraiser.

The charity fundraiser featured handmade Tribble tree ornaments, offered as a thank you gift to anyone who donated at least \$5 to the Texas Children's Hospital. LCDR Julie Jones of the *Zavala* made over 100 of the ornaments prior to the con, with other members helping to make more onsite. Due to their huge popularity, Earl Simon had to make at least 2 trips to local craft stores to buy more supplies. Overall, through cash and online donations, we raised a total of \$2,721.

But nothing could top the highlight of the weekend, especially for Earl, when William Shatner autographed the side of the Captain's Chair.

We came armed with Region and chapter business cards to distribute, and recorded names/email addresses from interested attendees for later contact using specially designed, and 3D printed, NFC devices made by CMDR Ruth.

Several *Star Wars* groups were also out in force with booths in the fan booth area, but we felt none of them matched the fantastic level of interest that the R3 booth garnered.

Everyone I spoke with had a great time and was very pleased with the appearance of the booth and the attention it drew. We hope attendance by approximately 23,000 conventioneers will encourage the organisers to sponsor this excellent con again next year ... we'll be rested and ready to sign up again by then!

Twenty-one STARFLEET members volunteered at the booth during the weekend and worked tirelessly - we were exhausted by the time everything was taken down and loaded to go home, and I would be remiss in not thanking them again for helping to make this such a resounding success: R3 RC Jeremy Carsten, Eddie Moore, Jay Sailors and Sarit Carsten - USS Battle Born; Ian Byrne - USS Tarvos; William Sturgeon - ÚSS Veritas; Earl Simon, Steven Shapiro, Julie Jones, Stephen Jones, Rayne Boyle, Melissa Ruth, David Ruth, Sam Ruby, Liz Richter, Esther Melendez, Chris Williams, Jeremy Mancuso, Jennifer Sutherland, Chuck Franck, and myself represented the USS Zavala.
