
along to Bud. We thank Weston for all his hard work revamping the site and doing an exemplary job. His upgrades added so much to the site.

WESTON BUILDS A MEDIA ROOM ... PART 2 From Basement to Death Star: My Epic Star Wars Theater Conversion By Weston Webb



In the heart of our home, an unfinished basement sat neglected and empty for years, a stark contrast to the bustling life above it. But three months ago, I embarked on an ambitious project to transform this space into something truly extraordinary—a Star Wars Death Star theater. Today, I'm thrilled to share the journey of turning that bare basement into an immersive cinematic haven.

Vision Takes Shape

The idea was sparked by a desire to create a unique and engaging space for our family and friends. As a lifelong Star Wars fan, the theme was an obvious choice. The project spanned a total of three months with planning, framing, electrical, plumbing, drywall, fabricating, sourcing, customizing and requiring many coats of paint to achieve the perfect finishes on every surface.

Each step brought the vision closer to reality, from spending many nights staring at a single wall to finally positioning the mannequins.

Advanced Features

The technological features of the theater are just as impressive as its visual elements. The LED panels, which all change colors and are easily accessible for customization or repair, add a dynamic ambiance to the room. I built a custom Han Solo in carbonite table inspired by the Regal Robot piece, adding to the immersive Imperial experience.

Seating nine people comfortably, the theater is designed for group viewings. A 100-inch smart TV, coupled with Apple Home Pods, delivers a booming sound that makes every viewing

experience spectacular. The setup is perfect for watching movies and TV shows, making it a favorite spot for family gatherings and movie nights.

Multifunctional Space

In addition to its entertainment value, the theater is equipped with ample power for any device, making it a convenient space for working from home. The combination of comfort, technology, and thematic design creates a surreal environment that feels like stepping into a galaxy far, far away.

The Final Result

Walking into the finished theater is an indescribable experience. The intentional attention to detail, from the costumes to the panels, transports you directly to the Star Wars universe. It's my testament to what can be achieved with creativity, hard work, and a passion for the subject matter.



This Death Star theater is more than just a basement renovation; it's a dream realized. It stands as a tribute to the timelessness of Star Wars, a nod to theater construction, and the joy of creating something special from scratch.

The recruitment section has some really cool posters. The inclusion of illustrations and images add so much throughout.


Zak: Return visits to the site are rewarded, there is always something new to catch your eye.

SUPERMAN By Richard Riley

What is going on with this HEAT!!! I am ready for Fall or Winter! Oh, well, nothing that any of us can do about it except stay inside where it is cool or jump in a pool!


For this month's newsletter I wanted to show something that is a bit "cool" since we are stuck in this heat! This is another themed desk but this time it is for Superman! The client is a huge Superman fan and actually owns quite a few props from the original movies that starred Christopher Reeve. The desk design draws inspiration from the 'Fortress of Solitude' shown in the 1978 movie, *Superman*. In the movie Superman's home is located at the North Pole and it is constructed from ice using technology from his home planet of Krypton.

This piece needed to not only have the look from the movie but to also be functional. I was able to purchase a white desk which would be used for the base of the build. I cut and added

foam around it to mimic the look of the 'Fortress of Solitude.' All of this was spray coated with truck bedliner then painted white with highlights of blue and silver.

I had to take care that the piece could be broken down for not only shipping, but to be able to go into the clients home. It is 3 components, the desk and the wrap around sections which are in two halves. As an extra bonus I added a control panel to the desk which is actually a desk organizer. In the movie the control panel is made up of clear cylinders that hold various crystals from the planet, Krypton, which contain information - just think of a flash drive for a computer! I installed a light underneath so that it can have the glow that was shown in the movie.

The client loved this piece and it now sits in the home office that he works from but my biggest compliment came from a gentleman on Facebook by the name of Brian Muir. He is a special effects artist that has worked on movies such as Star Wars (he is the sculptor of Darth Vader's iconic helmet) but he also worked on Superman. He reached out to me to compliment me on the way it looked and the creativity of the desk after seeing pictures of it.









A fun piece for sure and this is one I would not mind making another one of if the opportunity ever arises again!

MEDICAL MINUTE; JULY 2024 COPING WITH THE HEAT Commodore Tammy White, Chief Medical Officer

I hope we all have a safe, nice summer. There are a lot of fun and exciting things to do outdoors when we're allowed shore leave. (A little birdie told me that we will all be getting a lot of shore leave this summer.) This summer is on track to be one of the hottest we've experienced in recent history with temperatures already well into the 90s and 100s is some areas. I thought it would be prudent to send this reminder about the different heat emergencies we may experience and the best ways to avoid them and still enjoy the outdoors.

We all enjoy at least some of what the summer months have to offer however, summer comes with its own set of dangers. Every year thousands of people suffer from heat related illness, some of them are fatal. The three main heat related illnesses are **heat craps, heat exhaustion**, and **heat stroke**.

Heat cramps is the mildest form of heat related illness and consist of painful muscle cramps and spasms usually during, on or after intense exercise and sweating. The treatment for this type of illness is to rest, get cooled off, and drink fluids. If you pay attention to this warning sign of fluids you may not experience the next symptom, which is heat exhaustion.

Heat exhaustion is more severe than heat cramps and results from a loss of water and salt. It occurs in conditions of extreme heat and excessive sweating without adequate fluid and salt replacement. The body is unable to properly cool itself. Symptoms can include muscle cramps, pale moist skin, usually a fever over 100.4, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, headache, fatigue, weakness, anxiety and faint feeling.



Heat exhaustion can be treated much the same way as heat cramps. Moving to a cool place and resting is very important. You should also remove excess clothing and place cool cloths on the skin, fan the skin, and drink fluids that contain salt and sugar. If there is no improvement or the victim is unable to drink fluids you need to get to the hospital or urgent care facility for possible IV fluids. This can quickly turn into the next heat related illness, which is heat stroke.

Heat stroke is a true medical emergency and can include many of the same symptoms as heat cramps and exhaustion in addition to an increased temperature of 104, rapid heart rate,

loss of appetite, confusion, agitation, lethargy, stupor. It can also include seizures, coma and even death. If you have or

come across anyone with any of these symptoms it is vital that the victim get to a cool place and rest. Call 9-1-1 immediately as this condition needs to be treated by a doctor.

As with heat exhaustion remove excess clothing. Don't just place cool cloths on the skin but drench the victim with cool water and fan the skin, if available ice packs should be placed on the armpits and groin areas, and if the victim is conscious and can drink offer cool liquids.

These heat related illnesses can be avoided if you pay attention to the early warning signs and follow these simple preventative measures. Drink plenty of fluids when outside performing vigorous activities. Drinks should include water and sports drinks not alcohol or fluids which contain caffeine. Wear light colored, light weight, and loose-fitting clothing on the hotter days. If you must perform vigorous activities do them in the cooler times of the day, either early morning or late afternoon. Take plenty of rest breaks in a cool place out of the sun. Wearing a hat and sunglasses are also recommended as well as using sunscreen of at least SPF 15. Increase your time in the heat gradually to allow your body to get used to the heat. Wet down or mist yourself self during the time you are outdoors with a hose or spray bottle.

I found some tips for traveling during the summer. I always make sure I fill a couple of bottles of water ahead of time and put them in the freezer along with plenty of other water that's not frozen but cold. It's a good idea to pack snacks in case you get in a traffic jam or stuck somewhere.



Ideal snacks for travel include ones that will keep in your backpack, purse or carry-on without melting or falling apart. If you're traveling by plane, you'll want to make sure the snacks are TSA-compliant, so no liquid or gel food items over 3.4 ounces. Most importantly, the best snacks should have a combination of protein and fiber to keep you fueled and satisfied. Try to aim for about four grams each of protein and fiber, and keep added sugar to a minimum (under eight grams is ideal per snack, which is the equivalent of two teaspoons). Always prioritize fresh produce when possible, since they offer a great combination of fiber and antioxidants to keep you feeling your best during your travels.

Fruits and vegetables also are packed with water, a smart way to <u>stay</u> <u>hydrated</u> during your trip. Hydration in general is the key to savvy travel — especially for long plane rides, so don't forget to bring an empty <u>water bottle</u> with you to fill after you go through security at the airport. Since the altitude is dehydrating, and turbulence/delays can make beverage service unpredictable, it's worth the investment to buy a second, unsweetened drink at the airport. Pair that with these nutrient-dense snacks and you'll be sure to have a great vacation.

If you can stay indoors during the height of the midday heat, drink plenty of water (can't stress this enough), wear cool clothing.

I had never heard of reef-safe sunscreen but if you're going to the ocean you may want to look into it. It is designed to be biodegradable and not harm ocean life. Regular sunscreen bleaches coral and ensures humanity's swift death from climate change. I read that it's actually required by law in some destinations.

If you are traveling by car, make sure to get your car ready for the trip, too. It's best if you can avoid busy highways and roads where you may get stuck in traffic. Extreme heat can do a number on your vehicle and can cause some serious problems and ruin your vacation.

Check your tires and tire pressure. Pressure can fluctuate in different temperatures. Top off all coolants, fluids, and oils so they are full for travel. Check to make sure your air conditioner is working properly. It might also be a good idea to change air filters if you have not already. Make sure to check your battery. Fluids that you should check include:

- Coolant: This is the big one. If your coolant/antifreeze level is too low, it can cause overheating.
- Motor oil
- Transmission fluid
- Brake fluid
- Power-steering fluid
- Windshield wiper fluid

Heat can also cause damage to you belts and hoses. Check them, or have mechanic check them, before traveling. I hope these tips will keep you happy and out of Sick Bay during shore leave this summer. Is anyone going anyplace special this summer? Be safe out there.

FROM CMDR. STARFLEET, DAVID NOTTAGE - IMPORTANT

We are getting closer and closer to the Database migration. As the administration comes into compliance with AB resolution 20-01, members that have updated their emails and birthdates will migrate to the new system. Those members that do not have updated records will be transferred to a holding region until they do so ... **Region 90**.



As points of clarification, first, unique approved format emails for a member ≥18 (adults) must have a unique individual email which becomes your username in the new system. Second, birthdates for all members must be in the new system as well. As a reminder, only Gmail and Vanity emails are approved. Specifically, Yahoo, Hotmail, Outlook, AOL and some others are not valid emails for the database. If you are using any of these you need to change it. (NOTE: Willy and I believe this will be part of Phase 3 but are unsure. We will send out a Heimdal email when we get clarification about this)

Birthdates are to distinguish voting vs non-voting members bringing the membership into compliance with AB2—01. Members ≤17 years of age will use the primary members email with a unique identifier which will exclude them from voting and receiving communications from the organization. (We <u>BELIEVE</u> this is what he means ... for instance, Karen Hatter does not have an email but uses Jonathan's. Jonathan can add a 1 or 6 or some other number ahead of Karen's name on his family membership to work around this)

We are taking steps to protect the PII of every member. These changes should be nothing new to the membership as they have been part of the governing documents since 2020.

As a reminder, minors cannot join SFI as individuals. They must be attached to a family membership for the protection of that member as the responsibility is that of the parental unit/guardian.

Make note, anyone not meeting these criteria will not transfer to the new system and that will knowingly cause issues for your chapter numbers, regional verification, academy usage and time to repair and transfer you after the fact will take more time than you will like.

Further protections of your PII will be installed in the new database. All new and renewing members that do not have a rank to distinguish your age group will be auto generated for search purposes not using protected PII. All minors \leq 17 will be given the lowest Cadet rank and members \geq 18 will be set at Crewmen. By doing this we don't have to use your protected data and allow us to parse the members for voting and communication preferences. Chapters have the ability to update those ranks depending on the nature of the individual chapter organization. This will additionally add value to the person joining by giving them a rank within the organization.

• Please note that we will do our very best to accommodate the needs of the many. Details will come out with collaboration of all to ensure we are compliant with SFDPP/GDPR, NC Law and membership access.

Willy and I recently attended the Regional CO / XO meeting and here is some SFA information we were given:

Jill Rayburn, Director / Commandant of Starfleet Academy attended and passed along new information regarding the number of related Academy courses a student may take at the same time in the same school:

There is a new **Rule of Tens:**

Students may take as many as 10 SFA courses associated with the same school at a time, **but no more**. After the student receives a grade for 1 course, he/she may take another related course as long as it is NOT more than 10 at the same time.

The Director of the school has up to 10 days to grade, process and enter the student's grade into the Database and make the certificate available to the student.

The previous number allowed at one time (courses in the same school) was 5, so this is better for students wishing to be taking several related courses at the same time.

REMEMBERING JOHN G. TRIMBLE Reported by Glenda Blanks, Star Trek Editor from StarTrek.com

StarTrek.com is saddened to report the passing of John G. Trimble, who passed away the morning of April 19, 2024, as confirmed by his daughter, Lora Boem in a post.

Star Trek and fandom as we know it all stems from the efforts and passion of John and his wife Bjo Trimble, the couple who launched a grassroots letter writing campaign to 'Save Star Trek' following NBC's cancellation of the Original Series, resulting in a third season. With enough episodes then, Star Trek was able to enter syndication, propelling it into a phenomenon that warranted an animated series in 1973 and big-budget feature in 1979.

Recalling their efforts after a visit to the Original Series set, following the 50th anniversary honor, John Trimble told StarTrek.com, ''When we saw the change in the cast and crew during the filming of 'The Deadly Years' from what it had been before, we knew something was going on. It had been a very up cast and crew, and now it was very down - the mood. We found out by

going to craft services, the underground gossip source, that they were probably going to cancel the show after the second season. We had to leave and go back to Oakland, where we lived at the time, and on the way, we were talking about what a change it had been in the cast. I turned to Bjo and I said, 'There ought to be something we can do about that,' knowing full well that that was throwing down the challenge.''

The couple immediately sprang into action. John Trimble added, "We spent the rest of the trip going up the Central Valley, before Interstate 5, back to Oakland, discussing how to do it and putting together the Save Star Trek campaign."

Bjo Trimble credited John for building out the framework of their grassroots campaign, "We knew, of course, we were going to have to both mail letters. John went down to the post office, learned all about mail rules, and brand new was the zip code system. They told us, flat out, that if material wasn't zip coded it wouldn't go out as bulk mail, that it would just sit in the post office. John got all the books in those days, and it was stacks of them, and learned about the zip code rules. And we came home and put those into effect when we mailed out letters. John was downstairs with a hand-cranked mimeograph machine, turning out the letters, which we still have a copy or two. We folded them, labeled them and stamped them, and put them in bulk mail. He was doing a whole bunch of the physical work, the grunt work. I was more getting people over to help us. It was actually wonderful. We would work the volunteers hard all weekend. John was everywhere; he was the one who ran the errands. He's the one who lifted, toted, and basically it simply was not possible for me to do it alone. This is why we're a pair."

The decades following their legendary writing campaign, John and Bjo Trimble remained ambassadors for science fiction, the space program, and the Society of Creative Anachronism. The pair continued to attend Star Trek premieres and events, meeting



fellow fans and sharing their enthusiasm for each new iteration of Star Trek and generation of fandom, including last year's Star Trek: Picard Season 3 red carpet premiere in Hollywood, CA.

THE ZAK PERSPECTIVE

Tomorrow Gets Ready for My Generation: Review of the documentary *In Search of Tomorrow, part 2* By Zak Lyon



So, what does time travel look like to the time traveler? Studio heads, directors and special effects artists want to know when creating their worlds. But Bob Gale, producer and writer of *Back to the Future*, says that the three most important things are 1. character, 2. character, and 3. character, in that order. If the characters are believable, those other things are secondary. I tend to agree.

Through the character of Doc Brown, you KNOW he can invent something "way out

there" and it will work. You KNOW that Doc and Marty have a long-standing friendship. From **character** you can build the world without explaining the tech or backstory.

You can trust that I will comment on more than Bob's three points in this Part 2 of my review of the David Weiner produced documentary, *In Search of Tomorrow*. In addition to continuing to move through the 80s year by year, interstitials focusing on important themes of 1980s genre films are sprinkled throughout. I will continue with the chronological look at the movies while taking a few fascinating side trips highlighted in the doc.

Starting with Building Better Worlds, the director took us through nine mini features which are of interest to fans of the genre. From marketing, to musical scoring, to VFX and creature creation, these features explore the contributions made by 80s films to the science of genre filmmaking. In addition to focusing on these technical aspects of filmmaking, the documentary looks at more thoughtful, less technical topics as well and how they impacted future genre filmmaking. These include the Effect of the Space Shuttle and Challenger, Futuristic Visions and Cautionary Tales, Heroes and Antiheroes, and Looking to Tomorrow Today. These interstitials looked past the 1980s and were equally enlightening for genre fans. I'll give you a taste of a few of my favorites.

Just as the cold war affected the early sci fi movies of the 50s-70s, the hope and despair of the Space Shuttle program was reflected in the messages of the subsequent movies. It wasn't all doom and gloom like in earlier genre films. Things were different now. Manned space flight was now history for us, no longer fantasy. Our reality and our imagination of the future were coming together. We had mourned the loss of a mission in real time and survived. To paraphrase Wil Wheaton, Star Trek let us know that these brave adventurers would be remembered into the 23rd century in The Voyage Home's dedication to the Challenger. We knew we would come back and continue our journey into the future.

I also found the features on Scoring and Marketing interesting. The genre films of the 80s brought us beautiful symphonic scores with huge orchestras. Scores that can be hummed. (Today's scores have moved on to simply sound effects according to the doc.) Directors like Zemeckis and Gayle told composers to make our movies sound better than they are and Alan Silvestri writes his first symphonic film score for *Back to the Future*. This was the age of Goldsmith, Williams and Silvestri – long may they reign. Right? You hear the music and your mind goes straight to the movie.

This connects with the feature on Marketing. In the 80s, there was no internet, no YouTube, no podcasts... But we didn't need them. From the moment you saw that Michelangelo poster of ET or the futuristic Tron poster, the movie played in our minds and imaginations. This was the new world of the movie poster... where Drew Struzan was king. The posters gave a new landscape to play in ... we didn't need trailers and people to "break them down" for us. After all, seeing the poster was the first time I fought alongside the Rebels. (BTW It is still hanging up in my bedroom.) This is also a world where Reese's Pieces shot to fame for being the favorite snack of an alien. (There should be a guy whose job it is to keep kicking M&M executives daily for turning down Spielberg on this marketing opportunity.)

There was so much to ponder from these interstitials. But I need to get on to the movies. The ones that were waiting for me.

1985: Some say that *Back to the Future* was a "perfect movie." There was adventure, time travel, great characters, humor and more. But it also had something that all genre movies strive for. It was a human story. What would I do? What would I change? What would happen if I was there?

Another human story of that year was *Cocoon* with Ron Howard's desire to get to the heart of man's struggles and his great respect for older actors. And of course, the Cat in the Hat story for all awkward kids, *Weird Science*. These movies had technology as a device, but were really about the human condition. In 1985, genres and subgenres had been established. We knew how to build worlds, create rules, and stick with them. Sequels were emerging and filmmakers were experimenting with finding a balance between their responsibility to fan expectation and their creative visions.

In **1986**, Short Circuit, Aliens, the Flight of the Navigator and The Voyage Home, to name a few, were the results of experimenting with the genre. These movies were about Joy, Life, War, and Wish Fulfillment. Robots had personalities. Females took charge of a war in space. Kids were given their own special fantasy. And we see humanity as the villain in the conclusion of a Star Trek trilogy. When I think of 1986, however, I hear Johnny 5 cry "*I am alive!*" I learned the message of the joy of life from a sentient machine who was built as a military weapon. Something to think about.

In **1987**, we find Mel Brooks understanding of the genre and ability to make fun of it and the world we lived in at the time. *Spaceballs* was just one joke after another. You know genre films had come fully into the mainstream when Mel Brooks gets his hands on it! Existential movies continued with *Predator*. Technology goes awry in *Inner Space*. *The Running Man* predicts reality tv. (Hope we aren't that sick.) And a fight for dignity happens in the violent *Robocop*.

1988 opens the door to Japanese Anime and animation for adults with *Akira*. Do we have to destroy someone to save them? You can see where this led when you see how prolific adult animation is now! Sci Fi continues its tradition of sending messages to society in *Alien Nation* where a cop/buddy movie highlights the issues of race, discrimination and immigration. *Cherry 2000* is ultimately about love. Love in a post-apocalyptic world. What would you be willing to do if your Cherry 2000 broke? Even Ronald MacDonald had a genre cross-over in 1988 with *Mac and Me*.

1989 asks what if you had all the power in your hands and were too innocent to do anything about it? *Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure* worked because it was being played with complete sincerity. The characters were believable and you were pulling for them even as their decisions were cringe-worthy. Time Travel movies were getting tighter. The mechanics in this movie were realistic. The key ring is the best example. *Miracle Mile* was one of those "what if" films. Its desire was to be audacious. To take away hope. And to make people take action in the real world.

Experimentation continued with *Honey, I Shrunk the Kids*. Its effects were all practical and multiple solutions were used in each scene. It showed the creativity of filmmakers prior to computers being available as a tool. And James Cameron took experimentation almost too far in *The Abyss*. It was shot in a nuclear silo filled with water. Cameron almost drowned, he also had to give a rat CPR when demonstrating the bends to the crew. This was dangerous filmmaking to build a fantastical world which would amaze viewers. It was basically the reverse of Aliens which was brought to life with the reveal of this alien – an ILM water being that introduced what computer animation could do for the future of genre films

And, finally, we return to *Back to the Future*...2 which kind of forecast our obsession with the 1980s. This film picks up exactly where the last one left off, gets dark, and places the viewer firmly in Marty's futuristic shoes. 2015 didn't turn out to be much like it was portrayed in this film but it projected the time it was made. In the end, however, these movies are always about us.

1980s movies. We watch them over and over. We have our favorite movies, our favorite moments. These movies of the 1980s helped youth to figure out what they thought about "things." (Think about the half black/half white aliens – simple but available.) The documentary states that "story belongs to the person that it made an imprint on." It's about who you were with, where you were, what you were doing when you first saw it. Nostalgia connects us with imagination and helps us learn. We want to relive these stories because they made us what we are.

Before looking at this documentary I thought that improvement and evolution in genre films occurred gradually rather than seeing the huge jump-start provided by 80s films. It is said that these filmmakers were just kids themselves. Their stories showed who they were. I am glad that these pioneers took the creative risks to get their stories ready for my generation.

Aboard the Shuttle Quantico 1793/37

As the Heimdal shrunk into the distance, the members of Davis's Special Reaction Team busied themselves preparing for...nobody knew. The sense of fear and anxiety permeated through the whole interior of the shuttle as no one spoke.

Chief Millner was hunched over the main console as he piloted the shuttle with one hand, while his other hand manipulated a touch screen below.
