REPORT: COMMANDER, STARFLEET Fleet Admiral David Nottage, SCC 28197





Greetings and I hope this Communiqué finds you well!

We continue the progress moving forward to strengthen STARFLEET into the future, going strong with new Committees and new processes. We are working hard going forward for the benefit of SFI with a focus on "new blood." Here is an update on where we are:

As of today, The Administration has these new, completed or is still progressing on:

- The SFI Combadge Delta's have been updated. There are two new delta inserts one with the SFI logo and another with a departmental representation. Check them out.
- We have a new JAG officer Mike Watkins. He was approved at the ECAB meeting at the Atlanta IC. The 2024 IC in Atlanta and the VIC 24 were a great success. It was so much fun to see everyone and to see the Hybrid model in full use. Keep an eye out for announcements on IC 25 and IC 26 as we will have information very soon on both.
- We have stock on the 50th Anniversary items. Please look to the Quarter Master site if you want one.

More Work Ongoing:

- The ongoing creation of the new database platform continues. We have had a few setbacks but have a hard launch date now for by the end of year. We keep getting closer and closer. Infoserv is working hard to get it done.
- The Clean-up of the dataset continues in collaboration with the Admiralty Board in preparation for transition to the new platform before IC.
- Directorships: Outstanding departments are: the Chief Cadet Officer (CCO) and the Master Chief Petty Officer (MCPO). These

posts are on the VR site and we are compiling the information. We are looking at the current applicants and will have these roles filled soon.

- Further updates and clarifications within the Membership Handbook to enhance the experience and protect our membership. The MHB is in revision and will be presented to the AB for approval by the November meeting.
- We are in progress with looking at the Intellectual Property of the Organization ensuring no infringement on to the Franchise owners. We have been looking first at the STARFLEET and REGIONAL heraldry. These two segments are a part of the Corporation of STARFLEET and want to ensure we follow the vague rules set forth by the Franchise Owners. Their words are if it looks like Trek, smells like Trek, they own it, and absolutely do not make any money from it. Which is an idle threat that they are bigger and richer from a litigation standpoint than we are. We are also making recommendations to the Chapters. Chapters as the semi-autonomous and "Club" segment of the organization are offered comments and help, to better their heraldry but are NOT being forced make changes, with the understanding that they are responsible for their actions and choices if the Franchise Owners decide to take action. STARFLEET will not be responsible if a chapter is hit for IP infringement.
- We are working on the updates to the Style Guide based on the minimal provided info from the Franchise owners.
- Please continue to check your chapter rosters as there are many members that still have not updated their Birthdates and emails. These members will NOT transfer to the new system.
- Please note that we will do our very best to accommodate the needs of the many. Details will come out with collaboration of all to ensure we are compliant with SFDPP/GDPR, NC Law and membership access. The new SFDPP is complete and should be ready for all to take in the month of January. Be prepared to recertify during that time.

As always, we're looking ahead to bigger and brighter things for STARFLEET, and I'm excited to see what the future holds as we continue this incredible journey together.



The Return of the In-person International Conference.

After relying on virtual communication only for STARFLEET's annual International Conference, 2024 marked the return of the in-person event, along with the VIC component. Approximately 70 members traveled to the Double Tree Hotel by the Atlanta Airport to celebrate STARFLEET's 50th Anniversary and "press the flesh" of handshakes and hugs. First-time attendees as well as veterans of ICs past met and celebrated in "Hot-lanta" thanks to the heroic efforts of the VCS. ADM Ryan Case, who took up the challenge of organizing the first in-person IC since the COVID pandemic. "It was an utter joy to see the Conference come together and see an event take place that STARFLEET can be proud of for its 50th Anniversary," says Ryan.

The biggest "treat" of the weekend was the presence of four past Commanders of STARFLEET, Fleet Admirals John Bradbury, Les Rickard, Mandi Livingston, and Mike Malotte. Current Commander of STARFLEET, Fleet Admiral David Nottage, hosted panels with John Bradbury to talk about the history and future of STARFLEET, and a panel of all 5 current and former CSs for a roundtable discussion. We learned so much about how this organization was started by a teenage Bradbury, and has grown to the world-wide organization that we know today.

The weekend began Friday morning for members of the Executive Committee and the Admiralty Board with the once annual meeting as required by STARFLEET Bylaws. Several ECAB members were present in-person and other members joined via Zoom. COMM Laurie McFarland, RC 17, says of the AB meeting: "The AB unanimously approved moving STARFLEET Sciences to Permanent Auxiliary status, and installing Mike Watkins as the new Judge Advocate General to replace S. Christopher Boggs, who has become Regional Coordinator of Region 12. The AB was able to conclude its exclusive business in less than an hour - not sure if that's a record, but it was efficient."

Friday night featured a Cocktail Hour and Marine Dress Mess buffet dinner, led by Major General S. Christopher Boggs, Deputy Commandant SFMC. MGEN Boggs reports "The International Conference Marine Dress Mess commenced on the evening of August 2nd with First Fleet Admiral John Bradbury and his lovely wife, Fleet Admiral David Nottage and VCS Admiral Ryan Case. There was much merriment and plenty of toasts to go around. Thank you to all that were able to attend."

A special feature at Marine Dress Mess dinners is a recognition table for the lost, missing, and those who have gone before. A very special addition to the memorial table this year was the Korean War Veteran baseball cap with a US Army pin that belonged to Willard "Mac" McFarland, US Army Specialist, and father of COMM Laurie McFarland, RC17, who passed away on July 26th. COMM McFarland requested that the Mess raise a glass to her father, Mac, and the Mess obliged. Her emotional tribute touched the hearts of all those in attendance.

Opening Ceremonies Saturday morning had a processional entry of STARFLEET leadership in attendance, and the honoring of the flags. This was followed by a roll call of all vessels in the Fleet. Special guests were introduced, and several awards and promotions were announced.

Several panel presentations followed for the remainder of the day, including "History and Future of STARFLEET" with the first Fleet Admiral, John Bradbury, and the current Fleet Admiral, David Nottage. A pre-recorded version of their discussion, hosted by RADM Dean Rogers, was shown during the VIC, and is now available on the STARFLEET International YouTube channel for everyone to see.

Tactical Auxiliary members Michael Rosen and Dustin Williams hosted an engaging and in-depth discussion on the Tactical Overlay of the *Star Trek Adventures* RPG. Tactical also had tables set up throughout the weekend with STA and other gaming available for viewing or investigating.

STARFLEET Special Operations held a Conclave led by VADM Denise Rush, Commander of SFSO, and CAPT Michael Watkins, Deputy Commander of SFSO. CAPT Watkins reports: "The Starfleet Special Operations presence at the SFI















International Convention was wonderful. Our Starfleet Operations sign at the foyer entrance greeted everyone who entered. I enjoyed meeting people that hail from the USA, Puerto Rico, and beyond. It was wonderful to meet other STARFLEET Special Operations personnel in person at the IC that I only knew remotely through social media and the occasional Zoom meeting. The forums, meetings, prizes, and the general camaraderie was wonderful throughout the venue. I would have never known that our CS

was so tall! Now that I have been to the IC, I can now put faces and voices together. I recommend that everyone go to the IC when they are able to go."

SFSO Commander Rush stated: "There was a good turnout for the SFSO Conclave both physically and virtually. Both Operatives and non-Operatives attended. I was able to answer the questions posed from the group present and from our online contingent. I consider our portion of the IC a success. Not only did we gain some new Operatives to our ranks, but we also had some previous Operatives return.

On a personal side, it was wonderful to see old friends and to finally meet those people I only have communication with online for the first time. If you have never attended an IC, you truly need to attend at least one during your SFI lifetime. Trust me, you won't regret it, and it just might become an annual habit."

The Marine Muster hosted a large raft of well-turned-out Marines, led onsite by Deputy Commandant, MGEN S. Christopher Boggs, who says: "The International Conference Marine Muster commenced on the afternoon of August 3rd. The General Staff, under the command of Commandant General Edward Tunis III, announced the annual Marine awards via recording that was also presented at the VIC the previous evening. Congratulations to all of this year's recipients."

First time IC attendee and Marine, Major Julie Jones, reports from the attendee perspective: "The USS *Zavala* was represented at IC by a total of ten adult members and one cadet. Notably, the five Marines present attended the muster: COL Max Triola, myself (Major Julie Jones), Captain Samuel Ruby, LT John Stein, Lt David Ruth and Lt Melissa Ruth. We participated in a discussion regarding the newly updated Marine Force Manual (MFM). For many of us, this was our inaugural International Conference (IC) and our first IC Marine Muster, which added to the significance of the occasion.

The experience was immensely rewarding, and I found great value in the connections established with fellow members of the organization. The interactions and knowledge gained have only intensified my commitment to our mission and the goals of the STARFLEET Marine Corps. My shipmates and I are eagerly looking forward to future events, where we hope to continue fostering these relationships and enhancing our contributions to the organization."

The Final Mission was expertly managed by DJ O'Brien, of the USS Harry Mudd in R2. DJ began this remembrance ceremony many years ago and continues to ensure that it is a very dignified and moving tribute to those who have gone on to "The Final Frontier." The remembrance list included STARFLEET members as well as those associated with Star Trek who have passed in the previous year. Every Region of STARFLEET was represented in the tribute, and a precision team of members solemnly brought forth the STARFLEET flag to fold and present to the Commander of STARFLEET while the names of the deceased were read by VCS Ryan Case, John "Kiwi" Kane drove to Atlanta from North Carolina to be present for the reading of the name of his late wife, Mary Kane. The ceremony was a very emotional experience for everyone.

Saturday night's Formal Banquet had a large attendance and was a great time of socializing with friends you knew and friends you had just met, and to celebrate 50 years of STARFLEET. More awards were announced, and a live auction followed that had fierce bidding on a number of unique items.

A silent auction was held throughout Saturday. When VCS Case said Friday morning that he was missing someone to handle the auctions, I volunteered myself and the other members of the USS *Zavala* at IC. We jumped into











action organizing the donated items and labeled each of the over 120 items donated. We were aided by volunteers Corey Grant and Richard Graham. Together we had everything ready to open the auction Saturday morning and manage the auction room throughout the day. Both the silent and live auctions benefited the STARFLEET Scholarship Fund. After subtracting PayPal fees, the donations to the fund were \$1520.13! Thank you to everyone who donated items and bid to win!

The fun was not over yet! Sunday morning began with the "CS Roundtable." Hosted by Commander of STARFLEET, David Nottage, the roundtable included former Commanders of STARFLEET John Bradbury, Les Rickard, Mandi Livingston, and Mike Malotte. It was very interesting to learn more about the past of our organization from each of them and to quiz them on their views of how SFI is doing presently, and what they foresee going forward. Ryan Case said, "I was once told that Fleet Admirals don't tend to stay in touch after their term(s) end - but I thought it was a great sign of growth to see so many Fleet Admirals all in attendance at our 50th anniversary and they led a panel with the current CS!"

A usual part of any IC is the "Meet the Brass" panel where members of the EC present had the opportunity to briefly talk about their area of responsibility and take questions from the audience.

Joining the IC virtually, FCAPT Chris Poole, IS Database Technologies Engineer, presented an update and demo of the in-development new database. His explanation helped everyone get a better sense of what to expect when it goes live later this year. He also took questions from the audience.

CS Nottage closed the IC, but not before the appearance of a Region 2 tradition, "Mudd's Women." The ladies berated the CS on his (supposed) shortcomings and had him bend his knee to their, and the audience's, delight.

Many thanks to the IC "official greeters" and Registrars, Kelly Hilliard and Mike Henigan of the USS *Republic* in Atlanta. Seeing your

familiar faces and getting a needed hug was a great start to the weekend.

Fleet Admiral David Nottage expressed his feelings after the IC: "IC was a new and old experience for me. I had been to some as a member. some as an AB member, and now as CS. Each instance a few things ring true: 1. you get out of it what you put into it; 2. Fleet Friends are friends alwavs: and 3. there is no drama that cannot be solved. Of course as moving from position to position in Fleet happens, so does responsibility. From another perspective, I started as just a member. Seeing all that respect and comradery in our ceremonial times was always fascinating to see. I wanted to be a part of it. Well, I got it in spades."

I've attended many ICs in the past and each has had its own challenges and rewards. After "the COVID years," it was a real delight to see familiar faces and make many new friends. Smiles and hugs were plentiful throughout the weekend. A VIC certainly has its place and benefits, but nothing can replace the human touch. Ryan Case expressed the feeling well: "The biggest message I take away from this IC is that 'STARFLEET is family' - I felt it during the event and feel very proud to be part of this organization." Ask anyone who was there and they will say that being together, in the same place and time, with all those like-minded individuals, is like nothing else. I can't say enough how meaningful it was to have former CSs John, Les, Mandi, and Mike present. I encourage you to start putting your latinum change in a container somewhere and start making plans to attend the next IC in person.













VIC 2024 REPORT FCAPT Lynn Cowan, SC



SFI Virtual International Conference, 2-4 August 2024

This was the first year that the IC / VIC ran in hybrid format, with the in-person event in the US, and the VIC online via Gathertown. It was the 2nd year I'd attended (last year being my first) and I was thrilled when I heard it was running. I think I enjoyed it even more this year - and even though I spent hours at the event, somehow, I still ran out of time to do everything I'd wanted to do.

For those who haven't experienced it yet, Gathertown is a virtual space for meetings and events. Users have an avatar to navigate the space and attend activities, with in-person interactions that emulate reality. It has an 8-bit video game aesthetic, and users move through the online spaces using the arrow keys - it's straightforward, engaging and worked well with the *Star Trek* imagery and references.

The VIC had lots to offer - after teleporting in, you arrive at the main entrance hall with several rooms off, giving access to the Fan Fiction Room, the Academy & Library and Casino. In the Holodeck Suites, there were six to visit - Chez Sandrines, Vic Fontaines, Dixon Hill, Janeway Lambda One, Monastery of the Kai and Ten-Forward. Next is the second hall with Members Hub, Sciences Area and booths, and Go-carts available to use throughout Gathertown.

A full row of booths featured *Star Trek* guests, where you could view recorded interviews with Dominic Keating & Connor Trinneer, John Billingsley, Tim Russ, Doug Jones, J.G. Hertzler, Gary Graham, Doug Drexler and Dave Blass.

Other booths included: chapter and region booths with links and some videos (the USS Corsair had a cool, secret pirate ship!), auxiliaries, vendors with special VIC offers, *Star Trek* Adventures and The Planetary Society, among others.

One of my favourite features in Gathertown is the instant video chat you 'walk' your avatar close to another visitor and the video chat pops up automatically. This worked with several people at once, no matter where in the world they were - I enjoyed a great video chat with three others, speaking from the US, Australia, and the UK, and it was surprisingly smooth.


Events were scheduled almost continuously in a full programme. A highlight for me was The History and Future of STARFLEET Bradbury Interview, with John Bradbury, the first ever Commander STARFLEET, and current postholder, David Nottage. The schedule also included a range of STARFLEET Academy Open Houses (Sciences, IOSTS/COSD, IOMOS, IOMA, IOSC / CPHYS, IOLS, College of Spec Ops Resources, IOTK, Academy Accessibility), Sciences Trivia competitions, STARFLEET Medical Q&A. Marine Muster. Go-cart Race, Database Demo and Q&A, Piedmont Wildlife Center presents: Owl Bombs and Q&A, Star Trek Adventures, Women in Trek Panel, Petfleet Photo Contest Judging, SFI Retention 101. Award Announcements and Final Mission.

Less obvious on first arriving, but loads of fun, was the Scavenger Hunt - clues hidden around Gathertown which linked to various video clips - iconic scenes from science fiction shows, recordings of an orchestra in a concert hall, pop videos, singing cats - I thought I had found them all but didn't have my entry ready by the deadline. However, I really enjoyed searching and finding the great choice of clips - I hope it happens again, I'll be more prepared next time.

Like any good convention, you need to take a break every so often, and I really enjoyed spending time in two of the holosuites - Vic Fontaine's, a relaxing place to take some time out and enjoy the jazz and The Monastery of the Kai - with its extensive garden and temple, it was very peaceful.

The one event I missed was the Go-Cart racing, which I hear was hilarious. However, I made good use of the go-carts throughout the event - as well as being a lot of fun, they actually do help you move around the space quickly, very handy for moving quickly between events.

I would absolutely attend the VIC in future and highly recommend it. I really enjoyed this way of taking part, great visuals and design work, lots of things to see, do and visit - without the travelling, it was very relaxing. My thanks go to all involved with making this excellent event happen!

YETIDE BADAKI - The Law and Neera Ketoul

On this SNAPSHOTS edition, we continue our series of interviews from the Trek Long Island II convention in Hauppage, NY, during the summer of 2024. I enjoyed talking to one of the best defense attorneys portrayed on Star Trek and the entire law drama genre. Do you remember the second episode "Ad Astra per Aspera" of the sophomore season of the Paramount+ hit series Strange New Worlds? Captain Pike enlisted the help of Illyrian civil rights attorney, Neera Ketoul, to defend his Number One. Now, I ask questions and build a case to present to my fellow STARFLEET members. Let's welcome to our forum, Yetide Badaki!

Yetide, even though you are known to fans around the work for your work in American Gods, I want to focus on your amazing work in the second season of Strange New Worlds. You played one of the best attorneys I have seen in Star Trek history. How did you prepare for the role and what brought you to the role of Neera?

Well, first off, I don't know if you know this but I'm a huge Trekkie.

You are??

Oh my gosh! All the way back to Nigeria. The first time that I saw *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, it was over. I love the whole crew: Picard, Data, Riker, Deanna. I was so in love in life with that world from the get-go. I am such a fan. So when Orly Sitowitz, who cast me in *American Gods*, reached out offering this role, and I wasn't able to read the script yet because it was so secret, but she said, Trust me, you'll love it.

How did I prepare for it? I just took all of my favorite episodes & my favorite characters. Neera Ketoul - I should some of the diction from Sisko. The way he uses that when he is driving across the plain. There were moments of Guinan. I just drew from all of these individuals. Í also used real-life characters. My brother is a lawyer. I was able to reach him but I couldn't tell him what I was doing, of course. I think what really started was my love of Star Trek was already there. I could back and watch "The Measure of a Man", which is one of my favorite episodes of TV of all time. I got a chance to pull all of that together and really distill it into Neera Ketoul.

That's wonderful. If you could be the best Neera moment from that episode, what was that moment you said to yourself "I can't believe that I nailed it?"

(laughs) I mean as an actor you are never always going to nail it. I do have to say that the writing of Dana Horgan is so brilliant. The direction of Valerie Weiss is stunning. If felt like every time I got to get up and speak as Neera, it felt profound. There was a moment where one of the first times I did a speech about apartheid and the things that are considered legal. We do a crew one at the beginning so we can see where our blocking is, the lighting and all that. At the end of the run, the crew applauded. That's not something you get every day on the set.

Every time we get to speak about something deeply important, she did, like the conversation with La'an, in which she mentioned, "There's nothing wrong with you." All of those moments were so powerful that I felt really privileged to say those kinds of thoughts. That's wonderful. You mentioned moments ago that you are a Star *Trek* fan. Now I have to ask, if you were on the bridge of a starship, what role would you be best at?

Oh, yes, I think I could be a pretty darn good captain.

Oh, you're trying to take my job right!?!

But if I'm going back to my original just geeking out and characters I really loved & I really love Deanna. I love the idea of having a counselor in your career. You're actually dealing with things on a deeper level. I think that's an idea that we can take into our lives as we live them today, in different areas of work.

How much better would it be if you had a counselor in any area of work? So I really liked that as well. But you know, Captain, I'm not trying to take your job.

Well, don't worry, there's plenty of other ships in a fleet. So what is next for you?

Okay, this one I'm very excited about because I get to be an executive producer as well. If you heard of the 17th-century Queen Nzinga....

Yes, of Angola, right?

I will be playing this queen who I say she's a mix of, imagine all the best parts of Elizabeth, mixed with gender, mixed with Cleopatra, and she's just this warrior queen as well. And so we're doing that over at Lionsgate and Starz.

REPORT: DTS ADM Alex Rosenzweig, SCC 10712

Here's the DTS report for SD12408:

DTS activity was fairly steady in August. Two new vessel reservation requests were received, both for established classes. One chapter requested to change its name, class, and registry. No new shuttlecraft were reserved. No decommissionings were logged, but two names were released following decommissionings and the usual hold period. Three new classes and one new subclass were approved and announced for 'FLEET use, and DTS's documents were updated to reflect these changes. On the departmental offices side, ASDB is working on finalizing the Ouroboros-class fightercraft proposal, and CAPT Melrose is working with CAPT Bond on the design history and specs. Discussion also continued about a new ASDB logo to fit the current STARFLEET livery, as well as an online form for new class requests. OTI responded to one information request, and continued work on updating the *Trek* Timeline developed by yours truly. Work also progressed on the expansion of the Office's collection of vessel and station silhouettes for use in publications or for other graphical needs. Finally, we continue to search for persons to take postings in the Office of Schematic Art, but also received an application that looks very promising.

BGR Liam Smith is also working with me on, and taking point on the direct development of, a new full website for DTS. In July, Liam worked on carriers and support ships for the ships database. This will be a project that will involve some time, but it is progressing, and Liam has been working hard on this, along with his other roles.

Meanwhile, the Office of Research and Development, has remained in the discussion phase, and we'll have more news on that in the next few months, most likely.

"I appreciate you asking! You are welcome to use it for your website and anything digital but since I made it for STO it's a graphic Paramount owns so I'd discourage you from put it on any sort of merchandise you might want to sell!"

The logo discussion is therefore ongoing.

OTI responded to an inquiry about the Invincible-class space control ship in August. Most of OTI's other activities have continued apace, as well. OTI has completed the Lower Decks rewatch and material from that series is now being added to the Trek Timeline. Not sure if the next series to be rewatched will be Prodigy or Strange New Worlds. OTI has also been assisting the Avenger in the creation of its interiors for both an MSD graphic and deck plans. Work continues on the expansion of the Office's collection of starship silhouette graphics, for use in upcoming publications as needed. We are now just adding silhouettes for classes in use by STARFLEET as we add new classes. Next up will be figuring the best way to make the entire collection available for use, possibly by submitting it to the Graphics Repository on sfi.org. Also still in the planning stages is a project to prepare a set of ship views, all at a consistent scale, for use by STARFLEET, and some tech-related PowerPoint presentations.



SFA NEWS

From the Desk of the STARFLEET Academy Commandant

This year has been wonderful for SFA! In June, July, and August, more than 325 unique students took just over 7300 courses. This is the kind of traffic that we LOVE to see!

We recently announced a new policy regarding exams and processing. We call it the Rule of 10s. Here is the gist of it:

- Students can take up to 10 exams at a time from any college (schools within a college all count towards that college). Once you hit 10 exams in a college, we ask that you wait until those grades have been entered into the database before you take more from that college. (You may however go to another college and take up to 10 there as well, in as many colleges as you want.)
- Directors now have 10 days to process all exams, regardless of whether they are the automated quizzes or manually graded quizzes. For automated quizzes, that includes entering the grades into the database. For manually graded quizzes, that includes grading the quiz, sending the results and certificate, and entering the grades into the database.

Previously, we had a lower limit of courses at a time, and we had varying time frames for processing the grades. We believe this will be easier for both students and staff to understand. If you have exams that go past the 10-day period, please contact the Director for that college to inquire. If you have questions about this new policy, you can contact me at <u>sfa-academy@sfi.org</u> and I'm happy to help.

We have some new colleges in development that we are hoping to have open very soon. Some of our colleges have some new courses, so I recommend checking the catalog and Moodle frequently to see what has been changed/added. One exciting thing that will be finished by the time you are reading this is that we have combined the Bajoran Orientation College, the Cardassian Orientation College, and the Ferengi Orientation College into one college, named the College of DS9 Alpha Quadrant Aliens.

As you can imagine, our staff changes

regularly, as we say goodbye to some folks and hello to others. We almost always have openings for Assistant Directors, and that is a permanent listing at the <u>Volunteer Resources</u> <u>page</u>. You can also contact me to inquire about specific openings, but we still ask that you fill out the application.

NO MAN'S SKY VS. STAR TREK ONLINE ENS Vince Ceraso, SCC 86287





I have played *Star Trek Online* (STO),

as many people in our Fleet have. Like many of my fellow Starfleet officers, I have enjoyed it quite thoroughly. Despite the enjoyment I feel playing STO, as well as the recent *Star Trek Resurgence*, there's an element that I feel is missing; nonlinear, open-world exploration.

Enter *No Man's Sky* (NMS)—yes, that *No Man's Sky*, the 2016 space survival from Hello Games that flopped on release. Well, that was eight years ago. Since then, Sean Murray and his development team have given the game a much-needed facelift, bringing in countless thousands of new players including myself.

The universe of No Man's Sky is truly endless, with over 18,000,000,000,000,000 (quintillion) procedurally generated planets. Each time you step foot on a planet, you'll be greeted with an onscreen "First Contact" banner, proudly letting you know you're the first player to chart this uncharted celestial body.

Any and all discoveries you

uncover can be "uploaded" to the game's servers, forever logging your findings. Many players have even documented their discoveries on the NMS Fandom Wiki; if you search for Unbice Shallows, you'll find my many meticulous planetary/star system reports.

Once you've established first contact, you're free to explore. You can mine for resources, scan the environment and study the planetary fauna, minerals, plants. You can become the overseer of an NPC village, known as settlements, and make vital decisions for your citizens.

Let's talk ships. I love my USS *Franchise* in *Star Trek Online* as much as I love my *Paine's Voyage* freighter—named after founding father, Thomas Paine—with a full ship crew in *No Man's Sky*. Daily fleet expeditions will yield very valuable rewards. In addition, you can own your own personal starships.

Afraid of dying and just want an easygoing experience? No problem! The difficulty settings are made to be extremely flexible, allowing you to maintain total invincibility, turn off enemy attacks, and make all purchases free...and it *doesn't* hamper your achievement progress.

One of the best things about this game is the community, in which *No Man's Sky* players have founded their own in-game groups dedicated to exploration, base-building, defending star systems, and even claiming territories. I myself am a former "exobiologist" with the United Federation of Travelers, a familiar association of various player groups. (Recommended YouTube channels: Galactic Hub Project, HelloGamesTube, NoloPada, BunkzGaming.)

If you're looking for a way to live out your ultimate sci-fi fantasy, such as I've been doing over the last year, I'd recommend giving *No Man's Sky* a chance.

The universe is yours to explore. Enjoy the journey.

My timing couldn't have been better as Star Trek III: The Search for Spock received a re-release in cinemas for its 40th anniversary in June, remastered in 4k. As someone who wasn't born until after the movie was released this has never been one of my favourites knowing about Spock's death and rebirth long before seeing the films in which they take place has lessened its impact. Having now been out to watch the movie in cinemas, I am not too big to admit that I was very wrong. I've watched all of the Star Trek movies more times than I can count but I have never watched the film like this before.

Star Trek III is a piece of cinema. There are several scenes that play out in the film where the acting is at a level I have never before recognized. This is especially true in the scene between Kirk and Sarek in Kirk's apartment where both actors give career defining performances. Judging by the fact that there are multiple scenes such as this in the movie I would give praise to Leonard Nimoy's direction – he clearly was able to get phenomenal work out of his cast.

Another huge strength of the movie is the special effects produced by ILM. The movie introduces so many things that have become synonymous with the franchise as a whole - Spacedock, the Excelsior Class, the Klingon Bird of Prey and the Oberth Class. The fact that so many firsts are introduced in the same movie is astounding. Although it is very obvious this movie has been produced using practical models I can think of very few examples in Trek history that surpass Star Trek III. I only wish that the movable wings of the Bird of Prey were not broken for future productions and that it looked this glorious shade of green in every appearance - the ship is far more intimidating in this appearance than some of those that follow. When I was a kid my local toy and model shop had the selfdestructing *Enterprise* hanging from the ceiling. Seeing that sequence in theatres took me right back to seeing that model hanging from the ceiling. To borrow a phrase from James T. Kirk, "it made me feel young."

The 4k upgrade for the movie is strong. I had a momentary panic when the movie started because for some reason the flashback scene to *Star Trek II* that opens the film does not appear to have been upgraded to the standard of the remainder of the film. This quickly passed as most of the rest of the movie looks outstanding – only the civilian costume design makes it obvious it was produced in the mid-1980s. I have yet to upgrade my Blu-Ray to 4k, but this is certainly the best the movie has ever looked. I still have a couple of criticisms of the



Whilst Nimoy proves himself to be a strong director of drama his action direction is less effective. The death of David Marcus takes place almost off camera as he falls behind on-set foliage. The fight between Kirk and Kruge is also not one of Trek's best. Kirk is fighting the man responsible for the death of his son whilst being surrounded by a planet destroying itself - what appears on screen is not bad and includes the only Shatner-isms in the movie, but could have been better. My only other criticism is regarding the depiction of Starfleet personnel. From

Admiral Morrow to Captains Esteban and Styles and Mr. Adventure all of the non-Enterprise Starfleet officers are presented as stuffy, by-the-book and unsupportive. Whilst many of them have specific roles to play in the movie it would have been nice to see at least one of them presented as competent. Admiral Morrow especially would have benefited if the political scenes regarding Genesis from *Star Trek IV* had been included in this movie – at least then his lack of support for Kirk would have been understandable in a bigger picture context.

Heading out to watch the film was an experience in itself. This was the first time I chose to go out in public wearing my away team jacket from season three of Star Trek: Picard. I was hoping that I would not be the only one, but there was nobody else in uniform at our screening – although there was a good showing of Trek Tshirts. The other notable thing regarding the audience was its age – as someone entering their 37th year the same month as the movie's 40th anniversary I was amongst the youngest in attendance. Star Trek continues to have an ageing audience problem and based on the poor attendance of my screening a percentage of them are not engaging with events such as this. I should note, however, that I have also been to see the 25th anniversarv screening of The Mummy and Star *Trek III* had more than five times as many people in attendance so maybe this says more regarding the state of the cinema industry than Star Trek specifically. Having the opportunity to watch Star Trek III in theatres is not an experience I will soon forget and has changed my view of the movie. I hope nobody asks me to rank Star Trek's 13 movies any time soon because I do not know where I would put Star Trek III. It probably hasn't become one of my favourite movies, but I can certainly say that I have previously underestimated it. I look forward to having the opportunity of seeing the remaining eight features I have yet to experience in cinemas.

SFI Website

We are actively continuing the process of updating logos across all our sites to comply with the new branding and compliance standards. As part of this initiative, we update each logo as soon as we receive the finalized versions. This ensures consistency across our platforms, which is essential for maintaining our organizational identity. The scope of this work spans multiple websites and pages, and while it is an ongoing process, we are steadily making progress.

In addition to the branding updates, the responsibility for managing the Fleet Memorial has been officially assigned to our webmaster. They will handle all aspects of maintaining and updating the Memorial until further instructions are provided. This ensures that the Memorial remains up-to-date and accessible to those wishing to honor the memories of fallen members. Any changes or future updates will be communicated as needed.

To enhance security and ensure that only authorized members can access restricted areas of our websites, our webmaster has successfully developed and implemented a custom WordPress plugin. This plugin utilizes a password-protected interface, adding an extra layer of security to member-exclusive content. The creation of this plugin took several weeks and involved meticulous planning and development to ensure seamless integration with our existing infrastructure. For now, there are no immediate plans to expand these security measures to other areas unless directed by leadership or if a need arises in the future.

Our events calendar is scheduled for an upgrade to the pro version in the near future. This upgrade will provide enhanced functionality, allowing for a more streamlined experience when submitting and viewing events. We encourage all members, including those organizing virtual events, to submit their upcoming events through our <u>event submission form</u>. This ensures that all events are visible to the broader membership and are included in our centralized calendar. To stay informed about upcoming events, members can always visit the <u>event calendar</u>.

New Database Development

Significant progress was made on migrating the existing prototype functionality to the new frontend. One key component that was successfully moved over was the MSR (Monthly Status Report) tool. As part of this migration, some refinements and optimizations were implemented to enhance its functionality. Additionally, the new member registration system was also integrated into the new frontend, marking a major milestone in the migration process.

With the core functionality of the prototype now fully transitioned, the focus can shift to more complex tasks, such as building the Academy system and its associated permissions structure. The Academy structure is organized hierarchically, with data distributed across several tables. For example, a course is linked to a college, and the college, in turn, is linked to an institute. This means that an entry in the course table is associated with a corresponding entry in the college table, which is then tied to an entry in the institute table.

An important design decision was made to ensure that grades are stored autonomously, independent of the course's data. This way, if any issues occur with the course's table entries, a member's grades will remain intact and unaffected. This added layer of protection is vital for preserving the integrity of member records over time.

Creating institutes, colleges, and courses within this new framework is a relatively straightforward process. However, moving the existing grades from the old system presents a more complex challenge. This process will require careful planning and development to determine the best approach to ensure a seamless transition. The development team anticipates that migrating these grades will take additional time, but it is a critical step to ensure that the Academy system is robust and fully functional moving forward.

InfoServ Internal Help Desk

Current Open Tickets: 7 Tickets Completed in August: 34 During the month of August, the team focused heavily on addressing and correcting Region 90 re-assignments. This involved ensuring that member data was accurately reflected in the system and resolving any discrepancies related to regional assignments. In addition to these efforts, there was the usual volume of email-related tickets, such as resetting passwords, setting up email boxes, and general account support. Aside from these, the month remained relatively quiet, with only a few requests for website changes.

We'd like to remind everyone of a few best practices to help us serve you better. When submitting a request on behalf of someone else, such as a member of your department, please be sure to include their SCC number in the request. This ensures we can locate their information quickly. Additionally, the more detailed and specific your request, the faster and more efficiently we can process it. Providing all the necessary details upfront helps the Information Services team address your needs promptly and accurately, reducing back-andforth clarification requests.

Email Issues and Forwards

We are currently conducting a comprehensive audit of our domain's status across various email platforms to ensure that our emails are not being incorrectly flagged as spam. This audit involves reviewing how our emails are handled by different email systems and identifying any potential issues that may affect delivery. Our goal is to improve email deliverability and ensure that important communications reach members' inboxes without being marked as spam.

Unfortunately, this has been a complex and ongoing process, as each email system has its own set of rules and filters for identifying spam. Despite the challenges, we are making steady progress and are committed to resolving these issues. We appreciate everyone's understanding and patience as we continue to work through this.

Our primary focus at the moment is to remove sfi.org emails from the Vade Threat List, which is a major hurdle in improving our email deliverability. Being listed on this threat list causes some email providers to automatically





flag our communications as potential spam or malicious content. We are actively working with the necessary systems to remove our domain from this list and restore full functionality to our email communications. Once this issue is resolved, we expect a significant improvement in how our emails are received by members.

New Database Transfer Preparation

In the coming weeks, we will begin the process of migrating stages of member data from the existing database to the new system. This will be a phased approach to ensure a smooth transition without disrupting member services. The first step in this process is to deploy the new frontend onto the development server, which will allow it to be accessed remotely.

Once the frontend is successfully operational on the development server, we will initiate the first phase of data migration. This will involve transferring a new batch of members to the development server, providing them with access to the features and functionality currently in place. These members are individuals who had previously signed up for access through our form but have not yet been transferred to the new system. By moving them over gradually, we can monitor the process, identify any issues, and address them before proceeding with larger migrations.

Simultaneously, we are beginning to focus on the migration of Academy grades. This task is part of the larger ongoing effort to build out the infrastructure for the Academy within the new database environment. Migrating grades is a complex process, as we need to ensure that all historical data is preserved and accurately transferred. and Academy records will be an ongoing effort, and we will continue to provide updates as we reach key milestones.

SFI Servers Update

Recently, we encountered an issue where our Godzilla server experienced an overload due to an unusually high volume of server hits. This server plays a crucial role in supporting our infrastructure, as it hosts both our mail services and several of our secondary websites. The sudden influx of traffic caused a strain on the server, resulting in performance degradation and potential disruptions to services hosted on it.

In response to this situation, we quickly implemented a series of measures designed to alleviate the load on the server and prevent further disruptions. One of the primary actions taken was the introduction of rules to block IP addresses after they reached a predefined threshold of hits. This allows us to manage traffic more effectively by limiting access from sources that are generating excessive requests, which could be contributing to the overload. By doing this, we have reduced the likelihood of malicious or unintended traffic overwhelming the server.

Additionally, we deployed several other security measures to further protect the Godzilla server and improve its overall performance. These include enhanced monitoring of traffic patterns, the identification of potential problem areas, and adjustments to server configurations to better handle sudden spikes in demand. The combination of these efforts has proven to be highly effective, and since their implementation, we have seen a significant reduction in issues related to server overload. Moving forward, we will continue to monitor the performance of the Godzilla server closely to ensure that it remains stable and efficient. Should any further issues arise, we are prepared to take additional actions as necessary to safeguard the server and maintain reliable access to the critical services it supports.

Regional and Chapter Websites

Our two most recent additions to SFI hosting are Region 3 and the 3rd Brigade. Both are in the process of being set up as of this report.

All SFI Regions are eligible to receive a complimentary website hosted on SFI.org. To qualify, each Region must designate a webmaster responsible for overseeing website construction and management using the SFI WordPress multi-site platform.

In addition, SFI is now offering website hosting services to chapters and auxiliary units. Interested chapters can reach out to InfoServ directly for more information, while comprehensive packages are available on the QM site.

Outlined below are the two hosting options available:

Option 1: Host your website on our multi-site platform, [yourchaptername].SFI.org, with access to various plugins, SSL certificate security, and other features. Cost: \$65.00 per year

<u>Option 2</u>: Host your current website with a unique domain on our servers. Cost: \$75.00 per year

Transporters

Who has wished that they could be somewhere else in the blink of an eye?

Just walk out of your front door in a wet and windy Stornoway (for me anyway) and be on the beach in Spain...or go and visit relatives hundreds of miles away in the time it takes to switch the kettle on for a cup of tea and a chat.

In *Star Trek*, you can. You can finish your class at the academy (Starfleet of course) and go for food at your dad's restaurant in New Orleans (*DS9 "Explorers"*) or go home to see your parents in South Carolina to get your uniforms washed (*VOY "Non Sequitur"*)

'Transporters allow for teleportation by converting a person or object into an energy pattern (a process called "dematerialization"), then sending ("beaming") it to a target location or else returning it to the transporter, where it is reconverted into matter ("rematerialization").' Wikipedia

There is some evidence that the Vulcans had transporter technology prior to first contact with humanity but it was not widely used by them. The first transporter developed on Earth was by Emory Erickson around the 2190s and he was also the first human to use one. As Emory once remarked, "That original transporter took a full minute and a half to cycle through. Felt like a year. You could actually feel yourself being taken apart and put back together." Which may have been one of the main reasons that nobody really trusted the technology. The Enterprise NX-01 was one of the first starships to have a transporter system installed that was rated for biological objects (ENT "Broken Bow")

In the early days of its use, it sometimes could not differentiate between matter in the stream, as in the episode with an *Enterprise* crewman and a storm which had some leaves in the story. The crewman survived but for a while he was both man and plant (*ENT "Strange New World"*).

As the transporters were used more and incidents became rare, people were less hesitant to use them. Indeed, they became useful on more than one occasion as they encountered races that did not have the technology and realised that they could use it as a tactical advantage (*ENT "The Andorian Incident"*) The first ships to carry the tech usually only had one transporter pad, which could only transport a few people at a time.

By the 23rd century transporters were a lot safer and so were more widely used. Unfortunately, usage could potentially lead to Transporter Psychosis; an incurable condition that thankfully was prevented from becoming an epidemic with the advent of the multiplex pattern buffer in the 2310s. Someone with Transporter Psychosis could suffer from delusions, hallucinations, dementia and hysteria. It affected the body's motor functions and autonomic systems as well as the higher reasoning centres of the brain. Reginald Barclay thought he was suffering from this after he was attacked by energy microbes living in the matter stream while he transported from a disabled ship. (TNG "Realm of Fear")

By the 24th century the transporter was the most reliable form of short range transport and was used more than shuttlecrafts. You could now transport, beam if you would, from one site to another without the need for an intervening stop at a transporter station. Most races had the technology by this time and also the means to prevent it. However, when *Voyager* entered the Delta Quadrant, she found that most races there did not have the technology, the quadrant being not as advanced as the Alpha and Beta Quadrants. This led to them being constantly hounded for their advanced tech (*VOY "Caretaker"*)

A typical transport sequence, generally initiated by the request to "energize", began from the transporter console with transporter pre-sequencing. Once this was complete, transporter coordinates were established on the object or destination by the targeting scanners and then a transporter lock was made. Simultaneously, the object was broken down into a stream of subatomic particles, also called the matter stream. The transporter signal was then transferred to the pattern buffer, then again transferred to the emitter array. The matter stream was then transmitted to its destination across a subspace domain. When used, a transport could be detected by residual ionization left in the air.

From its earliest incarnations until the 2270s, transporters generally immobilized the subject being beamed during dematerialization and re-materialization in an annular confinement beam. Advances in transporter technology after that point allowed a person being transported to move or even converse during the process, as it was almost instantaneous.

By the 24th century transporters had advanced significantly. They incorporated biofilters that could filter out known substances and pathogens. They could, once a new threat was discovered, be recalibrated to filter it out. Energy weapons could be neutralised in the transporter process and weapons could actually be completely removed if needed (*TNG "Lonely Among Us"*) This could also be used to remove other things, such as clothes, as happened to Deanna and Lwaxana Troi when kidnapped by Ferengi. (*TNG "Ménage à Troi"*)

Most stations and ships had at least one transporter, with a Galaxy class starship having twenty. Every species had a certain beam type, with the Federation being blue/ white, the Cardassians gold and the Klingons red. The colour of the beam had no effect on the transporter itself, with most of the Alpha Quadrant

species transporters able to work alongside each other with no difficulties.

Portable transporters were also available, although they were bulky items and not very manoeuvrable. Well into the future, portable transports were incorporated into the combadge, allowing site to site transport whenever needed DIS Transporter booths were also used on most Federation planets, with each booth being linked to a specific location and offering instant planet wide transport (*"Star Trek Beyond"*)

Transporters could not be used if the target location had shields raised, which was why they were not as big of a tactical advantage as they could be. This could also trap personnel on enemy starships if the shields were raised after they had beamed over. The shields would have to be disabled to allow for rescuing. More advanced species could beam through Federation shields, such as the Borg and the Dominion. These could be stalled by rotating the shield frequencies, but this was only a delaying tactic. (*TNG "Q Who"*); (*DS9 "The Jem'Hadar"*)

We of course do not have anything remotely close to this technology, unless somebody in a secret lab somewhere is working away at it.

'Given all the challenges and based on our current understanding of physics and biology, it does not seem likely that such technology will ever come to fruition. However, famed physicist and science writer Michio Kaku wrote in 2008 that he anticipated scientists developing a safe version of such technology in the next hundred years.

We may very well discover unimagined breakthroughs in physics that would allow this type of technology. However, for the moment, the only transporters we're going to see will be on TV and movie screens.' ThoughtCo.com

This technology could revolutionise the transport industry, from holidays for fun all the way to transporting goods. Food fresh from anywhere in the world in the supermarkets the day after it was picked. As mentioned at the start of this article, the ability to step from your door with a suitcase and take a few more steps to the beach halfway across the globe.

Of course, this could also be used to transport troops. Sending a peace keeping force or rescue teams to a disaster zone within minutes of an earthquake or other disaster would save so many lives. On the other hand, sending an army to a country where you could keep troops going in non-stop would not be the best thing for the invaded country.

Good and Bad, Light and Dark, two sides of a coin that will always be a part of being human.

My, My, My Osyraa

As we all know, *Discovery* has ended but you can never keep a good villain down, especially when she is the baddest villain out there in the third season of *Discovery*. In this edition of SNAPSHOTS, I am in the presence of Osyraa, played by the amazing Janet Kidder!

How are you doing Janet?

Hi, I'm really well, thank you. Thank you for talking to me.

Well, I'm so glad to be talking with you. How does it feel to be here at the 2nd Trek Long Island Convention?

It's always an honor to be at these conventions and meet all the fans. It makes you feel like you know, you've done a really good thing by getting to create a character that everybody enjoys watching. So, it's good.

Tell us what piqued your interest in playing Osyraa in the third season, when the Discovery traveled from the 22nd century to the 32nd century?

Who would not want to play Osyraa in any century, anywhere on any ship in the world? That's my answer.

She is unlike any of the Orions we have seen in the past where they are good. Some were a little bit

treacherous, but you really took the bad guy to new levels. What was your inspiration for portraying Osyraa to that degree?

Well, Osyraa was fighting for her people. And to the point where yes, she made some iffy decisions. And she didn't always do what was necessarily right, but her motivation was always to provide for and to take care of her people.

Absolutely, you were one of the few bad guys to sit in the captain's chair, how did it feel?

It was amazing. And I gather that it upset a lot of people because that chair is held in such high regard. And so, for my character to just sit and swivel around in it and stick her leg up-- I mean, I think that was classic, perfect Osyraa. But apparently it rattled a few cages and people remember it very, very clearly and not always with fondness.

And it's always good to rattle a few cages, you know. Throughout the entire third season, what was the defining moment for you as playing Osyraa?

Well, taking the chair was one of the defining moments. But then trying to negotiate with Oded Fehr was really the crux of the whole journey for Osyraa.

Yeah, reaction to my character is really mixed. Some people really love Osyraa and other people don't want my photograph because they hated her so much. So, it's been a real mixed bag.

I think I did a really good job because they didn't like my character, and you're not really meant to. So...

BLACKSTONE SEES THE ECLIPSE Major General S Christopher Boggs, SCC 23592





April 8th, 2024

became a semi-national "holiday" for many throughout the central United States as the Great North American Eclipse blanketed much of the area in darkness for a couple of brief minutes. In this total solar eclipse, the moon covered the entirety of the sun for 6 Mexican states, 15 U.S. states, and 6 Canadian provinces, according to Jamie Carter with Space.com. It was an event that many had never seen before, especially children. Through the aid of specially designed eclipse glasses, or the often-built eclipse box, observers were able to watch the eclipse with ease. Over 50 million people witnessed the total eclipse, and 652 million people were able to see a partial eclipse.



Shortly after the eclipse ended, an announcement was made by Eclipse Glasses USA, LTD, that they would be accepting donated glasses, which they would sanitize and then bundle up to send to Latin America in late August. On October 2nd, 2024, Chile and Argentina will experience a Total Solar eclipse. Eclipse Glasses USA will be sending the donated glasses to schools, so that children will get to participate in eclipse activities.



When the crew of the USS *Blackstone*, based in Central Arkansas, heard about Eclipse Glasses USA's request for donated glasses, we jumped at the chance to help out. Over the course of the past three months, a joint effort of the crew of the *Blackstone*, the 275th Marine Strike Group and the 275th MACO's has resulted in the collection of 2580 pairs of eclipse glasses. The box, completely filled to the brim with glasses, made its way to the US Postal service. Weighing in at 20lbs, 10oz, the box started its journey out to Utah, where Eclipse Glasses USA is located.

The crew of the *Blackstone* would like to thank those who donated to our cause. It was a great campaign for all involved and I'm so proud of the hard work the Crew put into making this a great experience.



It's a pleasure to finally meet (online) the nebula of energy that is Clive Burrell, CO of International Shakedown Chapter of the year, the USS *Mercia*, to chat about the R20 stand at Destination.

As well as helping run the Region 20 booth at Destination 2024, the UK's only dedicated *Star Trek* convention, Clive is Editor of Region 20's *Runabout*. At the SFI IC in August, the *Runabout* was announced winner of two awards: International Newsletter of the Year and Front Cover of the Year.

I had been following all of the Destination news on Facebook and enjoying the *Runabout's* excellent front-page collage and articles, and this chat offered the chance to find out what the event was all about in more depth.

This year's event was held at the Norbreck Castle hotel in Blackpool and first foray outside of London and Birmingham. Now in an unofficial capacity, Destination took place over three days and attracted in the region of 4000 fans from around the UK. The venue allowed for the event to spread across a large area, with two big main spaces with all of the guests, for autographs and photos, merchandise stalls, a smaller talks hall, activities room and the Boston Suite, which

was seemingly at the other end of the world, and location of the R20 stand, costumes museum and display of Lego starships.

Hats off to Clive Burrell and the crew of the *Mercia* for the innovative setup. Prompted by an idea from *Mercia* Chief Engineer, Craig Walsh, they decided to forego the usual table and props and present an open stand. "The reason for this was because our aim was all about meeting people, in a relaxed environment, and chatting, promoting and talking about SFI." explained Clive.

The stand layout had everything you could need to promote SFI. Backed with R20 banners organised by RC, Richard Sams, all R20 chapters were visible with key information on-hand to use in chats with prospective members. There was also a video presentation, prints of the Runabout, and a map of the region, so conventioneers who were interested in SFI could check out the nearest chapter to their home address. "We wanted to be able to inform fans which chapter would be best for them, based on location and what each group offered. The 15 teams were very forthcoming in providing us excellent details on what they offered. It made a big difference." said Clive, "The response across the weekend was great and we talked to a lot of people. The stories behind why people became fans, what they had done for cosplays and their love of *Trek* were amazing."

The theme of the stand revolved around engaging the community, helped by the open plan design. Top of the agenda were meeting visitors, sharing information on SFI and recruitment. People had travelled from all over, in groups and individually, and were happy to have a conversation about *Star Trek* and SFI. So, by the end of the weekend, the recruitment goal was exceeded, with 20 new recruits signed up to SFI, over a third higher than the aim of 5 per day.

"The aim was not representing just the Mercia, but the whole of Region 20 and its individual chapters." Over the weekend, members from various chapters were there in their droves - from the *Mercia*, *Appleton*, *Merlin*, *Caroline*, *Stargazer*, *Boobrie*, *Cuchulain*, *Reginald Mitchell*, *Birmingham* and the *Alba...* "It was always busy at the stand, all weekend, and hardly a moment went by without visitors. It felt like a community."

Mercia team input was vital in bringing together two special elements in the booth. Firstly, Nathan Edward's concept and construction of the photo frame of SFI Members, with accompanying giant, printed R20 badge to hold when getting their pic taken. SFI attendees also got to sign the frame after having a snap.

Over the whole event, the highest score came in at an impressive 17 baskets in 30 seconds.

An added bonus for USS *Mercia* XO, and birthday girl, Marie Smith, were the Happy Birthday wishes from Armin himself, and a photo op with Nick Locarno, because Tom Paris wasn't available. And yes, there was cake.

R20 badges were given to several of the guests, thanks to Pam Kingsley and Sam Hardwick: Tim Russ, Christina Chong, Cirroc Lofton, Marina Sirtis, Armin Shimerman, Robert O'Reilly and Carolyn Seymour!

Other activities over the course of the event included diversity panels, guest talks, autographs, costuming, and stands run by other SFI members -Sven Harvey and David Zabiela from SD *Birmingham* on the Geekology stand, and a prop making workshop delivered by the USS *Cuchulain's*, Lee Raythorn. Clive also took part in the Best Episode competition, with Duet (*DS9*) the winner on the day ("I was robbed!") and, on Saturday afternoon, a talk on the "History of Fanzines in Star Trek" to a small audience on the second stage.

"We felt the weekend was a great success, with a fantastic team effort from start to finish in regard to SFI and the stand." said Clive, "Lots of fun, tons of engagement with the community and we can't wait for next year. There's lots we can do, and I can't thank those involved enough for their time and dedication over the weekend."



Jumja Sticks by Michelle Holst (Originally published in *The Runabout*-Q3)

Research

Jumja Sticks I always take two tacks when researching for "Anything but Gagh"- one is watching all the episodes in which the food is featured and freeze framing the screen or watching and rewatching characters eating the food. The most recent being "Red Directive" (Disco S5 E1) where there was a JumJa stick flavoured cocktail available. It first appears or is mentioned though, in a number of DS9 episodes including "In the Hands of the Prophets" and "A Man Alone." From what I could tell they are sticky, sort of chewy ice pop shaped confections. Though the shape is debatable, I included orange in my recipe for that famous Vitamin C.

Recipe

- 1 Itr Coca Cola
- 150ml orange juice
- 4 x 95ml ice pop moulds

Directions

- Add the coca cola to a pot and boil until it's a syrup
- Let it cool till it's warm and coats the back of a spoon
- Stir in the orange juice
- Pour into the moulds
- Pop them in the freezer and enjoy!

I made this recipe four times including

recipes with treacle, honey and sugar however as I mentioned it's a guaranteed way to lose your teeth. I settled on Coca Cola for sweetness and as it gives the colour that they appear in the shows. Juice gives some Vitamin C and contrasts flavours with the cola. The flavour might not be for everyone, but I enjoyed the challenge. Though frozen they retain that chewy texture.
